A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

The New Colossus by Emma Lazarus

*Not like the brazen giant of Greek fame,
With conquering limbs astride from land to land;
Here at our sea-washed, sunset gates shall stand
A mighty woman with a torch, whose flame
Is the imprisoned lightning, and her name
Mother of Exiles. From her beacon-hand
Glow world-wide welcome; her mild eyes command
The air-bridged harbor that twin cities frame.
"Keep ancient lands, your storied pomp!" cries she
With silent lips. "Give me your tired, your poor,
Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free,
The wretched refuse of your teeming shore.
Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me,
I lift my lamp beside the golden door!"*

As the conversation filled Facebook and the news media about the murderous, cowardly attacks in Paris that left 129 innocent people dead, the mood seemed to be swinging xenophobia. All of a sudden every Muslim who is fleeing war torn Syria, war torn Afghanistan, war torn Iraq and the worn world we are living in is a terrorist looking to strike out against the unaware population of the United States. In my mind, the words of Emma Lazarus inscribed on the Statue of Liberty, a gift of the French people to the United States on the occasion of our 100th birthday, appear to be going out of focus. We forget that all of us are refugees or descendants of refugees from some place else. Many of our ancestors escaped worn torn countries and lives, risking everything, just to get to these shores. We came from places of terrorism, but weren't considered terrorists. We had co-religionists who may have done terrible things, but we weren't judged evil because of their acts. In the case of the recent Paris murderers most of them were Europeans. Does that mean we shut down our shores to those from Europe? "Give me your tired, your poor, Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore...."

I will not let these murderous terrorist Jihadists alter the way I live my life. If I do, then they win. Yes, there are safety and security measures that slow my life speed down at times. I have to go through

We can protest and support without fear of arrest. We can agree and disagree and then sit down at a meal. The people fleeing Syria or any of the other war torn places are yearning for this freedom we love so much and at times probably take for granted. Not every Muslim is a terrorist nor is every refugee seeking a port in the storm.

We are about to celebrate Chanukah and we will remember our ancestors who fought for freedom of religion. We admire their courage and the great gift they left us. We have never forgotten what it means to be free from oppression and we have never taken for granted what this great country means to every Jew. From the Maccabees to today, we have sought and fought for freedom for ourselves and this right for others. Let us not give in to the temptation to turn inward now and shut the windows to the light of possibility and dreams.

Emma Lazarus understood what this country stands for. Let us insure that the refugees of the world get this chance as well.

From the President

Biennial—2015

November 4-8 Orlando, Florida

Rabbi Adland, Sandy Adland, Barbara Spera, Rob Schweitzer, Adele Gelb, Ron Gelb and professional of the URJ Shelley Schweitzer were present in Orlando with 5,000 of our world Jewish Family for an inspiring, powerful and great learning experience.

To quote Rabbi Rick Jacobs, president of URJ “our endeavors to strengthen congregations, to model and teach audacious hospitality and to work toward a less broken world are analogous to family life. We come together as a joyful diverse family, ready to become the best leaders we can be, and ready to celebrate each other and our wonderful Reform Jewish family.”

Adele Gelb, Ron Gelb and Rabbi Adland represented Temple Israel as voting delegates on resolutions.

Representing Audacious Hospitality, the Biennial’s General Assembly unani-

mously approved a comprehensive resolution on the rights of transgender and gender non-conforming people. This resolution urges congregations to advocate on behalf of transgender rights.

An overwhelming majority voice vote approved the resolution to amend the URJ’s constitution and bylaws enabling us to implement a new membership model in our congregations January 1, 2016.

Designed to be simple, fair, transparent and responsive, the new model, known as Reform Movement Affiliation Commitment, is a revenue-based system that will limit congregational annual support payments. This will positively impact Temple Israel’s annual budget.

An array of experts in all facets of Jewish communal life led more than 130 biennial learning sessions organized around four distinct tracks: Strengthening Congregations, Audacious Hospitality, Tikkun Olam and Transforming Texts.

To quote Adele Gelb, “the beauty of these events in the 21st century is that if you could not attend, you can “catch up” by watching videos available on YouTube” <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=c8GSfigtUh8&list=PLymjj01SGDev2RcQCAek7eWytg2Vv4CZ> I strongly urge you to take advantage of this opportunity. I thank the board of directors for supporting your Temple Israel representatives in attending such an incredible biennial. This experience brings to Canton, Ohio a new vigor in approaching social justice and the commitment to, and a better focus on, becoming a community of action.

I would be remiss if I didn’t recognize the hard work and dedication of Shelley Schweitzer for her part in making this experience such an overwhelming success. Mark your calendars for the 2017 Biennial.

Confirmation Mitzvah Project

The Confirmation class participated in the Canton community interfaith Thanksgiving Basket project on Sunday, November 1. St. Michael’s Catholic Church and St. Paul’s Episcopal Church coordinate this annual project, in which packaged food and cash donations are collected over a period of weeks, and baskets of food are put together and distributed to needy families in time for the Thanksgiving holiday. The Chadash Confirmation students helped with sorting the donated food. The completed baskets were distributed on November 21.

Chadash Guitar and Songleading Institute Chadash music teacher Sandy Adland is offering our 7th-9th grade students a year-long song-leading course, beginning this January, including instruction in guitar!

Students can stay after school on Sunday for a half-hour group lesson twice monthly and learn all the basic guitar chords that will allow them to play virtually any popular Jewish song. In addition, Sandy is sharing with the students the music and lyrics for many of the songs that are frequently sung in camp, school, and synagogue settings. The guitars are provided to the students through Chadash, with a nominal charge which will cover the cost of all classes and the use of the guitars during class and for practicing at home. Students who wish to take the guitars home over the summer may do so for an additional nominal fee. A big thank-you to Sandy for initiating and staffing this exciting new project, and thanks also to the students and parents who have responded so enthusiastically to this wonderful opportunity!
