## A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

February is Black History Month. Often, I would just think about this and ask myself why Black History needs a month. Then I read Colson Whitehead's *The Underground Railroad*. Each week I read the name of this book on the list and had a push-pull relationship with it. The New York Times says this is one of the best books of 2016. I'd ask myself, "Why do I need to read this book?" Then I'd say to myself, "I need to read this book!" So, I finally put it on my Kindle and read it.

What a painful, honest, sad, brutal experience was American slavery of the Africans. The book is fiction, but the experiences described were real, and it opened my eyes to my lack of depth of understanding of the horrific nature of the American slave experience. Maybe I thought that since my people were slaves once, what more do I need to know. No matter how bad our lives were as slaves in Egypt, it couldn't have been any worse than what we did to the Africans we brought to this country. (Yes, I know that my relatives weren't here yet, but we are Americans and must own our history.) I shudder to think that human beings treated others this way, but for slaves, in this case, they weren't people they were an "it."

Of course, Jews did experience the brutality of the depths of humanity during the years of the Shoah. Most of us have heard stories or seen pictures of the walking skeletons found standing or sitting inside of concentration or death camps in Poland, Germany, or elsewhere. Sometimes our labor was just to break our backs and not even for a purpose. The slave masters just did it because they wanted to do it. We did work for the German slave-masters, but we were expendable and replaced by the next slave once we dropped to the floor. I've read all about this, but not about the African slaves in the south. It was awful, sad, humiliating and scary.

The protagonist of the book is Cora whose grandmother was bought to be a slave on a fake Georgian plantation. The tale is of her escape as it traverses over several southern states. We feel her pain and suffering on the plantation. We are drawn into her hate of the whites. We experience love and loss on her attempt to escape.

After reading "*The Underground Railroad*," I understand why we need time each year to explore slavery in its many manifestations. We need to understand what one human being does to another when the victim isn't even seen as human. We need time each year to understand that every life should be valued in this country and in every country around the world. Most human beings in this world just want to live a life filled with love and happiness and friends. Some people in this world don't value these lives and that is so sad and depressing. We only get one shot to go around and it shouldn't be as a slave or a victim at the whim of another.

Read this book if you dare and then ask yourself what you can do to make the world a better, healthier, friendlier, more loving place for all.

**A Message from The President**

On Sunday, March 5, at 3 p.m. at Temple Israel, The Canton Symphony Chorus will present a Holocaust Cantata featuring songs from the camps. Not only is this concert a commemoration of the victims of oppression and genocide, it is a way that we honor two people who were integral to the growth and strength of our Temple family and of the Jewish and Stark County communities in general.

When Sanford Lazarus died in 1983, his widow, Gladys, established an endowment fund at the Temple with the purpose of providing "quality music that is open and free to the public." When Gladys died in 1997, her name was added to the endowment and the Gladys and Sanford S. Lazarus Memorial Fund was established to support the arts.

Through the years, the Gladys and Sanford S. Lazarus Artist Series has indeed provided quality music to the Temple and general communities. Performances have included presentations by such music notables as pianist Eunice Podis (z"l), Bonia (z"l) and Fanchon Shur, The Cleveland Symphony Orchestra Trio with Cleveland Orchestra Principal Pianist Joella Jones, and most recently our own David Fair, just to name a few.

Each time the Temple hosts a concert in this series, we note that Gladys, an accomplished violinist, and Sanford, a patron of the arts, honored our community with this on-going gift of music. Recently, I spoke to their daughter Marcia Lazarus Spiro to understand a little more about her parents and their involvement in our community.

Gladys grew up in Dover, traveling to Canton to attend worship services. Sanford moved from York, PA to Canton to be closer to his parents who were living here. The two met at McKinley Avenue Temple where they became active members of the leadership team.

Serving from 1947-1954, Sanford Lazarus is the longest tenured president of Temple with the exception of Temple founding president Leo Abt (z"l) (who held the position for 14 years). It was during Sanford's tenure that Temple Israel moved from McKinley Avenue to Harvard and 25<sup>th</sup>, and the rabbinic search was underway that resulted in Rabbi Paul Gorin's (z"l) coming to Canton. Gladys and Sanford always hosted rabbinic candidates, Marcia remembers. Not only was Sanford instrumental in bringing Rabbi Gorin here, he was instrumental in bringing Rabbi Lieberman to the community. In addition to his work at Temple Israel, Sanford was president of the Canton Board of Education and was active in the Canton Rotary Club.

Gladys could be found at the Temple as well, most notably playing the Kol Nidre melody each year. "She loved doing that," Marcia recalled. In addition to giving private lessons, Gladys was a violin teacher at Mount Union and at the College of Wooster. She was also active with the Girl Scouts and the McDowell Club. Sanford, who was in the wholesale auto parts business, was not a supporter of Unions, Marcia said, which is why Gladys, a violin performance graduate of the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, was never a member of the Canton Symphony Orchestra.
