A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

Social justice is at the core of living a Reform Jewish life. In fact, it is at the core of leading a Jewish life. Tikkun Olam—Repairing the World. We are commanded to get involved. Leviticus 19 says:

⁹When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap all the way to the edges of your field, or gather the gleanings of your harvest. ¹⁰You shall not pick your vineyard bare, or gather the fallen fruit of your vineyard; you shall leave them for the poor and the stranger: I Adonai am your God.

¹³You shall not defraud your fellow. You shall not commit robbery. The wages of a laborer shall not remain with you until morning.

¹⁴You shall not insult the deaf, or place a stumbling block before the blind. You shall fear your God: I am Adonai.

¹⁵You shall not render an unfair decision: do not favor the poor or show deference to the rich; judge your kinsman fairly. ¹⁶Do not deal basely with your countrymen. Do not profit by the blood of your fellow: I am Adonai.

So it is with this reminder from the Holiness Code in Leviticus that I want to present three opportunities to get involved. First—this summer Temple Israel will participate in another interfaith build at Habitat for Humanity. We will be building a house with our friends at the Islamic Society of Northeast Ohio. Along with ISNEO, Trinity Christian Church and St. Michael's Catholic Church both of whom we've worked on a variety of projects will be our partners. I am very excited about this team. We will need Temple Israel workers, lunch suppliers, and financial supporters to make this a success. The good news is that the first \$25,000 comes from a grant to Habitat. That means Temple is only responsible for \$6,250 which is about half of the commitment for the last house. Please be generous with your time and/or your financial support when we ask. I am looking for some leaders to help with the organizing so let me know if you want to take on this role.

Second—on February 4th, from 1-3 pm, Reform Ohio is having its first Northern Ohio gathering at Fairmount Temple in Cleveland. I am going and would be happy to drive another two people with me. What is Reform Ohio? It is congregations coming together to make a just Ohio. Reform Ohio is the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism's Ohio presence. This two hour gathering will be educating, inspiring, and informative. Let me know if you need a ride or that you will attend. You can see more info in Temple Tidbits.

Finally—the Temple Brotherhood Interfaith Engagement Project is presenting on February 11th, the movie "13th". The title of Ava DuVernay's extraordinary and galvanizing documentary, 13TH refers to the 13th Amendment to the Constitution, which reads "Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States." The progression from that second qualifying clause to the horrors of mass criminalization and the sprawling American prison industry is laid out by DuVernay with bracing lucidity.

We will begin at 5 pm with a \$5 Deli Dinner and some remarks. The movie will start at 6 pm. It is one hour and forty minutes. There will be a discussion of the movie after it concludes. If you are planning to attend, we need you to RSVP by February 7. Also, beyond the \$5 cost of deli—a bargain—the Temple Brotherhood hopes you will make a further contribution to the Interfaith Engagement Fund. A Message from The President

It's been nearly 20 years since Kelly Stokes and her daughters moved into their home on 14th Street in Canton. While you may not remember Kelly Stokes, many will remember her house. In our Temple family, we knew it as the "Habayit" House – the very first time we partnered with Habitat for Humanity. In 1998 the Temple committed to give of its time and its treasure to invest in Kelly and her family.

Although Temple members hung siding and helped on other builds in between, there was a significant gap between our first build and our second in 2016 when we built the Interfaith House for the Jenkins Family. As a result of that build, Habitat asked Temple to form a "trim crew" that has now worked on six additional homes so far and in 2018 we will again partner to help construct another home as a part of an even larger interfaith community build.

In the coming months you will hear more about the upcoming build and ways that you can be involved; today, I thought you'd enjoy hearing about the people who have benefitted from the generosity of our community.

So, come back with me to 14th Street. In the Fall of 1998 we stood alongside Kelly Stokes and her two toddler daughters as their house was dedicated. Today those "little girls" are grown and doing well. Kelly paid off her home and now lives in it mortgage-free.

Last year, Ronita Jenkins built her home with the Interfaith Build volunteers. Her family is doing so well that they sent along some first day of school photos from last fall. This was a very special first day of school, they said, because the children were able to get on the bus outside of their very own home!

Since Ronita and her family moved in, the trim crew has helped many families. Jasmine Garner said that she was looking forward to "having a better peace of mind and the wonderful feeling of knowing that I have taken this step to own my own home." She and her 6-year-old daughter and 6-month-old son had been living in a very small home that had structural problems including unusable outlets and light switches, uneven/unsafe concrete and windows that don't lock.

Norman and Marqitta Gardner and their five children were looking forward to a new home for Christmas. Before Habitat, the family of seven had been living in an overcrowded scatter-site home in Canton where there was extensive water damage, missing floorboards, warped walls, some roof damage and a concern about mold in the basement.

After spending nearly her entire life living in Section 8 government housing, Canton native Charlene Richards was ready to become a homeowner. She and her daughters, ages 16 and 18, worked hard to complete the sweat equity hours and take the House2House education classes provided by Habitat. Charlene said that "being able to say that the house is mine," is one thing to which she was looking forward. She also noted that she now has "something to leave my kids!"

Paul and Neva Collins were in desperate need of safe, decent, affordable housing when they completed their Habitat application. When the Temple trim crew was working on their house, we learned that the family was deaf, and therefore we were installing a few modifications for their safety and convenience. The condemned home in which they were living at the time was scheduled for demolition as soon as they could move into their new Habitat home.

The Boles family of six was living in a rental home that proved to be a nightmare. When they first moved in, they discovered bedbugs, a broken furnace, faulty plumbing and faulty electricity. Their situation was complicated by a landlord who was incarcerated. Although the Boles' continued to pay rent to the landlord's family, it was not applied to the home's mortgage and soon the property was in foreclosure. "A new home for the Boles family means everything to us," said Rhonda Boles.

And finally, we met Alyssa Allison who was just weeks away from delivering her twins when she worked alongside the Temple crew finishing up baseboards, window frames, putting in pantry shelves and installing a fan above the oven. Alyssa and her husband Tevin Burnett are also raising a two-year-old so Alyssa chose an open-concept design in which her family can thrive and grow.

The Temple's partnership with Habitat for Humanity has been a labor of love and learning. We have opportunities to celebrate religious differences as well as our common values. We work alongside homeowners who are putting in the hundreds of sweat equity hours on their own homes and on those of others as a part of their contract with Habitat. The new homeowners work in the Re-Store and take classes on how to maintain their homes all while juggling their regular work schedules, children and family.

Although I've been a home-owner for nearly 40 years, it is through volunteering at Habitat that I have learned how to install baseboards, frame windows and doors, trim out a closet, cope a corner, hang siding, do roofing, install and connect an oven fan and put up shutters. I've learned how to use power tools and how to properly paint a door and hang a mirror. The patience and encouragement demonstrated by Habitat volunteers and staff is extraordinary. The relationships being forged and the satisfaction of knowing that you are in some small way helping someone to realize their dream of homeownership is priceless.

Including Those Who Are Differently Abled

February is Jewish Disability and Inclusion Awareness month, and though this organized effort was established a decade ago in the United States, this history of Jews looking out for people who are differently abled dates back to the Bible. Moses himself was known for a speech impediment, and Isaac and Jacob lost much of their sight as they grew old.

Even with these large examples of disabilities within the Torah, perhaps it is G-d's strong wording of the commandment "You shall not curse the deaf nor place the stumbling block before the blind" (Leviticus - 19:14) that denotes G-d's insistence that we must look out for those with different needs. The text from the Torah continues with a warning, "You shall fear your G-d. I am your G-d." In other words, G-d stresses the importance of being completely inclusive of each individual no matter their abilities.

At Chadash, we recognize that each student learns at their own unique pace and with different strengths and weaknesses. Our lessons are geared to encompass learners on all levels. While some class time might be taught orally, other lessons will be visual. In addition, there are opportunities throughout the year for our students to learn by doing in an experiential hands-on way.

For instance, rather than a traditional Tu Bishvat Seder to celebrate the holiday as has been done in year's past, Chadash students will participate in a Tu Bishvat scavenger hunt on February 4, facilitated and created by Canton's Israeli Shlichim, Gili and Uri Hershkovitz. The hunt around Beit Ha'am will include clues relating to the holiday, and each station will involve the students in aspects of the Tu Bishvat Seder relating them through a lens of Israeli culture and geography.

Also this semester, Chadash students will learn about Passover by participating in a Passover story walk where they will hear the story of the Exodus out of Egypt. The story walk will end in the social hall where students will be able to taste and learn about the symbolic foods on a Seder plate. This year's confirmation class will be facilitating this exciting new event, which gives them the opportunity for the leadership we hope they will pursue within the community after they are confirmed in May.

At Chadash, we take "You shall not curse the deaf nor place a stumbling block before the blind" to heart, and as February's awareness of the topic unfolds, it is our extreme pleasure to honor all the different types of learning that takes place in our school. We are happy to have the opportunity to include every student in our structure and feel that each one of them is a blessing.
