A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

We are past the winter solstice and it is time for the days to gradually get longer and before we know it (God willing) spring will be closing in on us. During the gray days of winter you need to be positive and find things to hang on to. Optimism is a part of my life. I want to believe in a better life, a better world, and a better future. Pessimism is contrary to my outlook on the world and the way I live my life.

Judaism, despite the pains experienced during our long history, is a forward looking, forward thinking, forward moving religion. We believe in a better tomorrow and work to make that tomorrow a reality today. We do not occupy our minds and hearts with sin and hell, but with creating a world that is filled with goodness, mercy, compassion and justice. At the same time we know that it won't happen just because we wish it. It will happen because we work to make it so.

We are facing an increasingly adversarial world. The deepening crisis throughout the larger middle east from the Mediterranean Sea to the mountains of Afghanistan evidence rising partisan and sectarian conflicts that are more brutal at times than we are used to seeing or hearing about. The tensions between this country and some of the Asian block countries is filled with mistrust which poisons any attempt toward reconciliation. In this country partisan politics are dividing communities everywhere we look. Negativity and pessimism fill the air we breathe.

We must find a way to start bridging the differences that divide us and find common ground to unite us. There have been some interesting stories about the great Christmas cease-fire in 1914 during WW1. Despite the pleas from the military leadership such as generals and politicians, the soldiers called a halt to the chaos; listened to each other's Christmas songs; played an international soccer game. The leaders thought this stupid, as it would make it more difficult to kill the opponent if you knew him better. Too bad this stupidity didn't totally take hold, and millions ended up dying. Like the great

Martin Luther King Shabbat Service
Friday, January 16, 2015, 7:30 p.m.

Our special guest speaker will be Cantorial Soloist David Fair, who will speak on "Growing Up Black, Jewish & Gay"

David Fair has served as the Cantorial Soloist at Temple Israel since 2012. At the time, he was singing in a children's opera with the Canton Symphony, which is when the Cantorial search committee got word of a Jewish singer performing in Canton. David was, at the time, a graduate student at the Cleveland Institute of Music. He graduated in the Spring of 2014 with a Professional Studies Diploma and Artist Diploma. Previously he served as the Cantorial Soloist at Rodef Shalom in Pittsburgh, PA and Temple B'nai Israel in White Oak, PA.

He has been working in Jewish education since his days being a camp counselor as a teenager in Baltimore. He has also been a classroom religious school teacher, the Shabbat Coordinator at the Cleveland Hillel Foundation for two years, and has led a trip to Israel with Birthright.

This past summer David led workshops at Camp Nehirim, a week-long retreat for Queer Jewish Men. David also holds a degree in theater from The University of Maryland College Park.

David currently resides in Chicago. He keeps a very busy schedule as a professional opera singer, musical theater performer, and sings regularly for St. Thomas The Apostle Church. He is the art teacher and chorus teacher at Josephinum Academy (a private girls Catholic high school) and he tutors children in Hebrew at Temple Shalom, where he happily fills in as the rent-a-Cantor when their Cantor is out of town. Because he's not busy enough, David also teaches several yoga classes a week.

From the President

This month's article begins in 1980 with our search for a new spiritual leader. Rabbi Gorin had become seriously ill during the summer of 1980 and while he made a remarkable recovery, he and Dorothy decided that he would retire on August 1, 1981. The search committee knew that this would be a great challenge because Rabbi Gorin, during his 27 years as our Rabbi, had become beloved by the entire Congregation. This was evident during his retirement dinner in May, which attracted the largest turnout of any affair in Temple history.

While the search committee faced a daunting task, they were up to the challenge. After many telephone interviews the committee traveled to Shaare Emeth in St. Louis. There they attended a service led by Rabbi John Spitzer. They spent their time during the Oneg asking congregants how they liked their assistant Rabbi. Everyone spoke positively about Rabbi Spitzer but there was one slight problem. No one in his congregation knew he was looking for a new position. The cat was out of the bag!

Rabbi John Spitzer was the unanimous choice of the committee and in August of 1981 he, Cheri, and their sons Joshua and Gabriel were welcomed to Canton. Rabbi Gorin became our Rabbi Emeritus and the love and respect shown by Rabbi Spitzer was evident at every service and life cycle event shared by our new Rabbi and our Emeritus Rabbi.

Rabbi Spitzer added his special brand of warmth to the Temple. My adult children still remember most of his High Holy Day Children's Services and sermons; the Bucket Sermon being an all time favorite! Amazingly, it never rained for their Rosh Hashanah Open House. As the adults kibitzed and enjoyed the amazing pastries the children played football in the backyard and gorged themselves on Cheri's famous chocolate chip cookies.

In 1985 we celebrated our 100th anniversary by holding a yearlong celebration. We hosted the UAHC Regional Biennial and the community Thanksgiving service. We also remodeled our Sanctuary, foyer, library and gift shop.

Rabbi Spitzer became involved in many community boards, putting great effort into the Stark County Hunger Task Force. In 1986 he was elected to and installed as a member of the National Board of the Reform Zionist organization and in 1987 was elected Vice President of ARZA. At home he encouraged the congregation in its Outreach Program whose purpose is to meet the special needs of members who are Jews by Choice. One of the first innovations introduced by Rabbi Spitzer was the Saturday morning discus-

sion group followed by a Shabbat morning service. Stollen Moments is still going strong.

The beginning of the Temple's second century saw outstanding congregational programs on a variety of subjects. In 1986 the Board voted to hold Religious School on Sundays for grades kindergarten through eighth grade. The High School Academy would meet on Monday evenings. Previously, kindergarten through sixth met on Saturday morning, seventh and eighth met on Sunday morning, and the High School Academy met on Monday evenings. This decision was met with enthusiasm on the part of parents and teachers alike as well as changing the dynamics of our entire school. The 1986 Confirmation Class gift to the Temple was a Teacher's Plaque that honored teachers who had served on our faculty for 20 years or more. In the years that followed many names were added to the plaque until it was filled and an additional plaque was ordered. In addition, the Religious School honored Dottie Jacobson with a special plaque for 40 years of service. As a congregation we have always been supportive of Jewish education and those who teach our children.

Sisterhood and Brotherhood maintained their decades-long importance to the congregation. Their significance continued not only because of the many programs each held, but also due to financial support of the Temple and Religious School. Our Youth Group, under the leadership of Rob and Shelley Schweitzer, was strong and involved most of our Temple youth. They were active participants in Temple life as well as local and national youth group events.

When our congregation was young and growing we were looking to increase our space, rent a bigger facility, build the McKinley Avenue Temple, and ultimately move into Temple Israel on 25th Street. In 1999 we were faced with a new challenge.

During his Rosh Hashanah morning sermon, Rabbi Spitzer urged us to look at the demographic challenges facing our Stark County Jewish community and the need for a communal assessment of what our future should look like. In January the Jewish Community Federation, Temple Israel and Shaaray Torah Synagogue announced the initiation of a dialogue to discuss possibilities for a new paradigm for our community.

Next month we will look at how we met the challenge and what the future holds for us.

Chadash Classes Resume

Tohar and Ofri will help our students create tree-themed art works that will be sent to a school in our sister community in the western Galilee.
