A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

With deepest thanks to Debbie Sinopoli, Fran Wells, Randi Smuckler, Judy Tenenbaum, and Sandy Adland for organizing our annual Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Shabbat Service on **Friday, January 12, 2018, at 7:15 pm** (with a special oneg following the service.) This annual Shabbat service celebrates the life and legacy of Dr. King, opening our doors and sanctuary to the Canton community and inviting a speaker to address Dr. King's legacy in the world we face today. This year we are blessed to have with us **Brenda Stevens**, who is currently Director of Multicultural Services at Malone University, where she provides support and leadership with regard to the unique needs of students of color and international students, serving as an advocate for a community that thrives on diversity. I certainly encourage everyone to join together for this special and unique worship experience.

Like many of you, I remember the day that Dr. King was assassinated and the tense days that followed. It was a scary time in this country already feeling the heightened protests against the war in Vietnam which was dividing communities and families. A few months later, Bobby Kennedy was assassinated, and you wondered what was going to happen next.

In Indianapolis, there is the King-Kennedy Park. Here is a link to the page, which includes a picture of one of the most beautiful pieces of historical art--<http://kennedykingindy.org/the-park>. It shows King and Kennedy reaching out to each other but unable to touch.

Bobby Kennedy was on his way to Indianapolis to deliver a campaign speech the night of King's assassination. Kennedy acknowledged that many in the audience would be filled with anger, especially since the assassin was believed to be a white man. He empathized with the audience by referring to the assassination of his brother, President John F. Kennedy, by a white man. Kennedy then delivered one of his most well-remembered remarks: "What we need in the United States is not division; what we need in the United States is not hatred; what we need in the United States is not violence or lawlessness, but love and wisdom, and compassion toward one another, and a feeling of justice towards those who still suffer within our country, whether they be white or whether they be black." He finished by asking the audience members to pray for "our country and our people." Rather than exploding in anger at the tragic news of King's death, the crowd dispersed quietly. Indianapolis focused less on the birth of Dr. King and more on this moment in Indianapolis' history. For several years, I participated in the King-Kennedy event.

Regardless of whether you remember what Dr. King brought to this country through his words and actions, by remembering his birth or reflecting on his death, it is important to remember. In an age of increasing division and partisanship, we need to find ways to heal and help and forge a stronger tomorrow. We need a country that values all citizens regardless of race, gender, sexual orientation, or religion. We need to climb to the highest mountain and let freedom ring.

As I marked what would have been my father's 87th birthday – just two weeks after marking his 12th yahrzeit, I was talking with some friends about the different ways that people remember and celebrate those who have been important in their lives. Of course, I do not need a date to remind me of my father, he is with me always. Even so, those significant dates have a way of seeping into the psyche. Some people honor others by giving of their time; others of their treasure. Some continue the work left unfinished by those who came before, and others visit graves where they place a small rock on the headstone to symbolize the permanence of memory.

Recently I attended a cooking class with our Shlichim, Gili and Uri, where they taught us how to make Israeli Shakshuka (a tomato/egg dish) and Israeli cheesecake (which tasted more like a blintz than anything you'd get at The Cheesecake Factory). They used the favorite recipes of fallen Israeli soldier Staff Sergeant Evyatar Turgeman and told us about this 20-year-old hero. Now whenever I eat Shakshuka, I will remember him.

Each January, there is a group of now 30-somethings who log volunteer hours at destinations all over North America to honor a friend that they lost eight years ago. They post where they have spent time and what they've done adding to the hours spent changing the world in honor and in memory of their friend. Through these deeds they come together as a community that is united in memory even though they are separated by miles.

I know someone who planted a tree at her home to remember a friend; now her family will tend that tree both as a tribute to her and to the friend she lost. You might choose to plant a vegetable or spice garden that elicits memories or is your way of perpetuating life.

Some people model for others by making contributions that link their name along with that of the person they are remembering; others make anonymous donations, choosing to remember in private. Perhaps you walk for a cause or bike to raise awareness. Maybe you devise a ritual of going to a particular restaurant where you can recall good times spent together.

Regardless of how you choose to remember, know that
