A Message from The President

A synagogue is three things: a *Beit T'fillah*, House of Prayer; a *Beit Midrash*, House of Study and a *Beit Knesset*, House of Gathering. In recent weeks I have been struck by just how often our congregation and our Jewish community home, Beit Ha'am is each of these things. The size of our Friday night congregation ebbs and flows depending on the weather and events. Recently our numbers swelled as one of the newest members of our congregation received her name and others were blessed on the occasion of their birthday.

As a House of Study, there are dozens of adults who come together regularly to explore Torah or to teach our children or learn in a community setting. Sometimes these gatherings reach beyond our Jewish community and engage the secular community as well.

Brotherhood's Interfaith program on prison reform drew from the Jewish and general communities in a significant way. More than 100 people of multiple faiths broke bread together and learned about efforts to reform the Ohio prison system. Temple Israel was the gathering place for this study that fostered a better understanding of the inequities, statistics and realities surrounding incarceration in this State and the gathering fostered relationships among community members that share values regarding the treatment and redemption process that is and could be.

In February after the tragedy in Parkland, FL, Temple Israel hosted a gathering of people who had expressed interest in "doing something." Those of us who felt we could no longer sit idly by came together at Temple Israel to discuss options beyond thoughts and prayers. The teens who were there led the way to orchestrate the March for Our Lives rally that many members of the Jewish community attended. While the meeting that Temple hosted was a sort of impromptu gathering in response to people who called and asked what we could do; I am proud that it was Temple that opened its doors for the initial conversation. Indeed, we are a *Beit Knesset*, a House of Gathering.

Recently our community gathered to remember those who were lost in the Shoah. The Canton Jewish Community Federation again planned a meaningful and thoughtful Yom Hashoah Holocaust Remembrance Day observance. Again, I was struck by the diversity of the audience who came together for this solemn event. There were Jews and gentiles sitting side-by-side in solidarity as together we remembered. That evening, Beit Ha'am was indeed a house of prayer, study and gathering.

On display that evening were several Holocaust project boards that were created by Jackson Middle School seventh graders who are members of Temple or Shaaray Torah. Several seventh grade classes participated in the Jackson Middle School Holocaust project exhibition which I visited in an effort to support the teachers and students who took the time to study and understand what happened during that horrific time in history. While there, I came across a diorama that had as a part of it the name of Dr. Thaddeus Stabholtz, z"l.

Under Dr. Stabholtz's name it read "Seven Hells," and listed the names of the seven camps that Dr. Stabholtz survived. "*Siedem Piekiet*" (Seven Hells) is also the name of Dr. Stabholtz's memoir. I asked the young man how he knew about Dr. Stabholtz, who retired from medical practice in 1994 and died in 2009.

The young man told me that Dr. Stabholtz had been his grandmother's doctor. Wow, I thought as the reality of this statement sunk in. I remember Dr. Stabholtz and I know his daughters; however, it was in that moment that I learned even more about the man who shared his story with his patient; a patient who had so much respect for him and his story that she owned the "never again" message. She passed the story along in such a way that a seventh grader chose to remember Dr. Stabholtz in his diorama.

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Temple Israel is so much more than a congregation that strives to meet the spiritual and emotional needs of its members. Indeed, the purpose of our Temple and core values of our entire Jewish community continue to make a far-reaching impact when we open our home for prayer, study and gathering.

A Little Tikkun Olam on Earth Day

Each year, towards the end of April, Earth Day is globally recognized, and communities all over the world give light to repairing what needs to be fixed. If this sounds familiar, it is because the concept of repairing the world goes all the way back to the Biblical age. Not only is *Tikkun Olam* an act of repairing, but for Jews worldwide, it is also one of our core values.

Though Tu Bishvat has also become a Jewish Earth Day of sorts, when the world comes together to focus on a belief that we hold so close to our hearts, we must join along with them and actively engage all that we can.

This is why Chadash committed itself to collecting old batteries in April and learned the importance of recycling. The students sorted lithium from alkaline and learned to tape the positive ends. They bagged the batteries, as well, and once the work was complete, they were donated to the Canton Recycling Center.

The students learned that household batteries can all be recycled and should never just be thrown in the trash. As a community, we can support their efforts by bringing in our own batteries to any of the donation drop offs below. *Tikkun Olam* after all is a year-round endeavor and should not just happen on Tu Bishvat or Earth Day. In addition to defining and prioritizing the characteristics we are looking for in our new rabbi, it is also necessary to articulate who we are as a congregation and what makes us unique. We need to consider both where we stand at this moment in time and the direction that we see ourselves moving in the future. What is it we want for our Temple? What role can our new rabbi play in bringing us closer to our goals?
