A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

Last month I wrote about our effort to grow our Gan Bracha by moving to make this an interfaith experience with Rev. Anissa Bacon and the members of New Vision Church. The lunch meeting was quite successful and sometime early this winter we will have a meeting to plan out the produce for next summer. Also, Stan Rosenblatt agreed to open up four more ground level beds bringing our total to 12 4x8 beds. We will certainly be able to help many in the Canton community who are in need by donating healthy, fresh produce for their diets.

My journey as a rabbi has always found its way to intersect with hunger programs. From supporting Mazon, to collecting a ton of food in Lexington at the holy days, to partnering and serving on the board of Gleaners Food Bank in Indianapolis, finding ways to help support those with food insecurity has been a part of my life's work. In Canton I am still finding my way, but our Gan Bracha is a great move forward, as well as encouraging donations to our Federation Food Pantry. I have another way for people to get involved.

As many of you know, at the annual Interfaith Thanksgiving service which this year will be held at 7 p.m. on November 25th, at First Lutheran Church 909 East Tuscarawas Street, we take up a collection to benefit the Thanksgiving Basket program run by St. Paul's Episcopal Church in downtown Canton. This program has been running for

**Global Day of Jewish Learning,
Sunday, November 16**

10:00 am – 11:45 am at Beit Ha'am

The Canton Jewish community will celebrate Global Day of Jewish Learning on November 16, 2014 at Beit Ha'am. This is one of our community's most popular events and features scholarly discussions with our clergy.

The theme for 2014 is "Heroes and Villains, Saints and Fools: the People in the Book." This year, our program will be held "Hevruta-style." Participants will break up into small groups of 3-5 people to discuss the topic questions and together, we will create a Community Talmud. Each of our participating clergy, Rabbi Adland, Rabbi Kushner, Rabbi Spitzer and Hazzan Braun, will take a turn addressing the entire group, posing relevant study questions on the theme. The groups will examine the question and decide on answers that will be shared with the entire audience. A light breakfast will be served.

This is the fifth annual Global Day of Jewish Learning. Our community has participated every year, since the first Global Day celebrated the completion of Rabbi Adin Steinsaltz' monumental Hebrew translation and commentary on the Talmud.

The mission of the Global Day is to bring the Jewish people together once a year to celebrate our foundational Jewish texts through community based learning.

From the President

As I was sitting on the Bimah during the High Holy Days I thought about my first Rosh Hashanah in Temple Israel 37 years ago. We have experienced many changes since I moved to Canton in 1977. At the Long Range Planning meeting it was suggested that I write about Temple’s past, present, and future. This month’s article will focus on our history from its beginnings through World War II. Since I am a relative newcomer to Canton I relied heavily on our 100th Anniversary Book printed in 1985. In 1885 a handful of Jews obtained a charter from the State of Ohio, and Articles of Incorporation were drawn for the C.K.B.C. probably standing for the Chevrah Kaddishah Bet Canton. It read in part:

The purposes for which this association is formed is for the visiting, nursing (sic), and aiding such of its members as may be overtaken with sickness, to provide for the suitable internment of its members in case of death according to Jewish (sic) rites and ceremonies, to promote religious and social advancement, the establishment of a reading room and library, literary entertainments and Sunday School.

So began the history of Temple Israel. As you read the above paragraph does it still resonate with our membership today, 129 years later? While the language may seem archaic I think some of its intent is still what we expect from our Temple today. Our Congregation, which was founded mainly by German Jews, had many homes during its early years. We started in the Empire Building on South Market between Second and Third Street and as our Congregation grew we had two more moves. The first was to the Isaac

Harter Bank Building, and then to the second floor of a building on the southwest corner of North Market and Sixth Streets. In time we needed to hire a part time Rabbi who conducted services on Sunday morning, so he could lead Friday night services in his home Congregation. High Holy Day Services were either lay led or conducted by a student Rabbi. In 1892 at the request of Rabbi L. Nusbaum, the Ladies’ Aide Society was organized under the leadership of Mary Stern. This was the forerunner of our Sisterhood and from the beginning its mission was to serve the needs of our congregation as well as the community’s needy. As soon as we had enough students, a religious school was started and Confirmations were held as often as there were sufficient numbers to hold a class. In 1915 we purchased a lot on McKinley Avenue north of Ninth Street and construction began as soon as World War I ended. We now had a “home of our own” with a sanctuary that could seat 200 persons and rooms below for religious school classes and social events. Even though our official name remained Canton Hebrew Congregation, we became known as the McKinley Avenue Temple. Arthur Bonheim was hired as our first full time Rabbi. Interestingly, his salary was so small he needed to seek additional employment. In 1922 we hired Rabbi Charles Latz who would serve our congregation for over twenty years. Rabbi Latz made significant contributions to the development of the congregation. In spite of the hard times of the Depression, our Temple experienced health and growth. By 1935, our Golden Jubilee year, the Board was able to restore the salary cut Rabbi Latz generously accepted and to present him with the gift of an automobile. Sister-

hood’s anniversary gift to the Temple was an organ. Due to overcrowding, the Religious School was on the move and finally held classes at the Jewish Center on Fifteenth Street and Market North. Children of non-members were still welcomed for a small fee, teachers were paid and Confirmation was held annually. We had also outgrown our cemetery provisions in the cemetery at Nineteenth to Twenty-first Streets between Cleveland and Woodland Avenues and in 1935 a full section was acquired at West Lawn Cemetery. In 1938 a Temple Men’s Club was formed and the Board began to discuss enlarging the building or possibly constructing a new one. Rabbi Latz was permitted the innovations of wearing a robe for the Holidays, reciting the Kiddush blessing, and substituting a Jewish Adult Education lecture for the sermon from time to time. With the outbreak of World War II, all future planning was put on hold and the Board voted to return the monies that had been raised for remodeling.

Next month I will begin our history at the end of World War II.

Classroom Notes

The students and teachers of Chadash have been very busy during the first several weeks of school. Because the holidays came later this year than they have recently (relative to the secular calendar), the students had an opportunity to really study the holidays in depth, especially Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur, before they arrived.

In other news, the 5th-7th grade students have begun their year-long study of the books of Nevi'im (Prophets) and Ketuvim (Writings), and all of the students in grades 3 – 7 are enthusiastically collecting and trading the new Chadash Bible cards (and reviewing their knowledge of Bible figures and stories at the same time)! In the History classes, students have been learning about important figures in the early history of the Jewish people, and the 6th and 7th grades are taking virtual trips back in time with the Do-It-Yourself Jewish Adventure books, in which they learn about the background of a particular historic period, imagine themselves in that place and time period, and make choices that will alter the outcome of their own stories.
