A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

In October, Temple Israel was honored along with St. Paul's Episcopal Church, the Islamic Society of Northeast Ohio, and Habitat for Humanity for the Public Service Award. As most of you know, in 2016, the three religious organizations mentioned above came together to build a Habitat home for the Jenkins family. There is something absolutely incredible about taking people with or without any skills and building a house. From spreading the gravel to putting up the sides to installing the drywall and trim to painting and finishing, volunteers give of their time and energy and create a home for a family.

In October and November, Temple Israel will once again be a major partner in the Thanksgiving Baskets Downtown project. Volunteers (<http://thanksgivingbasketscanton.org/volunteers/>) are still needed to help sort the donated food, put the food into bags, and finally, distribute the food on Saturday, November 18. Just click on the link and sign up. Except for the distribution, the volunteering is done in the early evening. We will be distributing more than 900 bags of food and turkeys. Your help and participation is encouraged.

Let me also thank everyone who participated in the annual campaign to restock our Jewish food pantry. Last year the items donated lasted 6-7 months. If you haven't brought in your bag with goods—it is never ever too late to do so.

Tikkun Olam is at the heart of living a Jewish life. I believe the soul is the celebrations on the Jewish calendar, observing Shabbat in some form, paying attention to the ritual of Jewish life, but whose heart is "repairing the world." Whether it is helping to serve a dinner at the Urban Ark on Easter Sunday or the Sunday before Christmas or one of the other Sundays (if you haven't participated in this mitzvah, let me know and I will get you on the list) or any of the other social justice opportunities you do with Temple or in your life, these acts make this world a better place for all.

Let me conclude with notes of High Holy Day thanks. Thank you to the volunteers who sang in our choir. It was awesome. Thank you to Rabbi Spitzer, Linda Simon-Mietus, and Sandy Adland for sounding the shofar. Thank you to the many people who read Torah, Haftarah, a reading on Yom Kippur afternoon, sat on the bimah, held a Torah, walked with a Torah, ushered, or just came and helped me make the Holy Days special. Thank you for all the positive comments about the new Mahzor. It worked and certainly uplifted my worship experience.

Finally, thank you to my wife Sandy who supports me through my High Holy Day preparation, leads the music at the young Family Service, makes an incredible challah for break-the-fast, and is ever present.

A Message from The President

*Sing unto God in thanksgiving; Acclaim Adonai with joy, all the earth.
 Serve God with gladness; Come before the Divine Presence with singing
 Psalm 100*

The leaves have fallen, the air is brisk, and we are suddenly engulfed in the rites of Fall that permeate our society. We are encouraged to think about those blessings for which we are thankful.

On the first Friday in October, there were approximately five families with young children who came to worship. Most of the children were under age 5. They all seem to know the drill... an oneg treat before the service and then into the sanctuary. They make their way to the front. Some sit with friends; others sit on a step; the babies are held so they can see and others crawl toward the Rabbi and Sandy who was leading music that night.

The congregation is smiling as they watch the moms, dads, grandmas and grandpas trying to reign in the children. I smile because it is clear that these children love being at Temple; they are comfortable in this space. They know what is coming and they participate.

The Rabbi distributes a stuffed Torah scroll to each child and a child "helps" by collecting them and putting them back in the box. The music begins and blessings are said and a child who is too young to speak in sentences points to the table on the bimah and says "challah." Another little one crawls to the instruments so that she can be a part of the "Michamocha Band" and the older children await instruction to collect donations brought by congregants for the Federation food pantry.

There are a few tears and some laughter; older children help younger ones when they drop a toy or reach for an instrument. As the service continues you see older children following along in the prayer book. You see a child shield his eyes as the Shema is recited. A child's voice rises above the crowd as his "la, la, las" add to the prayerfulness of the *Baruchu*.

The children carry their stuffed Torah scrolls as they march through the sanctuary singing the *Hakafah* song, raising their scrolls "up and down and in and out and all around." They sit on the floor as Rabbi reads them a story with the help of his puppet Katani and then they help Rabbi open the Ark and stand before it respectfully when it is time for the *Aleinu*. Finally, they gather around the table to say the *Motzi* and the little one that started the service anticipating a piece of challah toddles up the ramp and waits for Rabbi to give her a bite.

Family Shabbat may not be the most quiet, reflective Shabbat I've ever experienced; however, it is perhaps the most meaningful. There is a joyful noise in the sanctuary when it is filled with children who are enjoying themselves as they observe Shabbat.

As I count my blessings this Thanksgiving season, I count among them a Temple family that welcomes the children and finds hope and happiness in the joyful noise that they make when they "Come before the Divine Presence with singing" – whether that singing takes the form of a scream or laughter or words of prayer.

Chadash, November 2017

With Reverence

In the Midrash, Tanna de Bei Eliyahu Rabbah writes (26:6)

This is what the Holy One said to Israel: My children, what do I seek from you? I seek no more than that you have the love for one another, honor one another, and that you have awe and reverence for one another.

In Chadash classrooms, students are most often guided through their learning. Teachers develop engaging lesson plans that helps their classrooms examine Jewish life and thought.

In this text from the Midrash, it is clear that there is a goal for children to develop a relationship with one another that carries with it a certain level of respect. Certainly, the time our students spend with each other in the classroom helps to develop this, and that mutual admiration amongst the Chadash student body was so abundant this past month as Chadash students led their own High Holy Day services.

Where one student lacked in skill, another student lifted them up to help pull together the pieces. Where another student exhibited strengths and talents, their counterparts encouraged and gave them the space to shine.

These same qualities came forth at our Tashlich in the Park program and at the Family Sukkot party as well. Our youngest Chadash students watched the older students expertly blow the Shofar and hang decorations in the Sukkah where they were too little to reach. The “olders” looked at the “littles” through a lens of “they are so cute.”

Learning to “have awe and reverence for one another” is a skill that is nurtured over time. It is a quality that allows an observer to see the good in humanity and to have an understanding that we must do whatever we can to bring the goodness out in one another.

As the Chadash faculty helps to bring these traits to practice among their students, the students make it a reality. Their great care for one another is what makes Chadash such a special place.

Journey To Israel
October 21-November 2, 2018
With Rabbi Jon and Sandy Adland
Guide—Doron Bookshtein

This October, 2018 trip to Israel is designed for people who may have been before. Though we may go to some familiar places, Doron has structured these experiences so that they take on a different flavor or a new twist. We will visit wineries, do some shuk noshing, have a seminar at Yad vaShem, go to the Rockefeller Museum, time in Tzefat, and more.

The trip will 13 days/10 nights.

It includes:

- All entrance fees
- Bus
- Guide
- Porterage
- All breakfasts
- Welcome and farewell dinners
- Dinners at kibbutz hotels (Dor and Kfar Blum)

It doesn't include:

- Lunches
- 5 dinners (one in Tel Aviv and the first four nights in Jerusalem)
- Tips for guide and bus driver

The cost per person is \$3670 with two people per room. If someone wants a single room the cost will be \$4937 (*this does not include air—we will not organize a group rate as many people choose to use miles to fly to Israel. Many people will end us flying at the same time, but not all.*)

Leave from the US on Sunday, Oct 21

Arrive at Ben Gurion Aiport on Monday, Oct 22—Welcome dinner and first night in Tel Aviv. **Dan Panorama Tel Aviv**

Tuesday, Oct 23--Day 1- **Tel Aviv's other story**: From Jaffa port with the second aliya to Neve Zedek- the first Jewish neighborhood of Jaffa. Then on to Levinsky market for shuk bites. Visit the Lehi (Stern underground) Museum. We'll end the day at Independence Hall. Tel Aviv. **Dan Panorama Tel Aviv**

Wednesday, Oct 24--Day 2- **Woman Zionist power**: Hannah Senesh Museum at S'dot Yam, Caesarea antiques museum with a boat ride in front of Caesarea. On to kibbutz Ein Shemer. Lunch and visit the Tishbi Winery. Down the mountain to Dor for the museum and beach time and overnight. **Dor Nachsholim**

Thursday, Oct 25--Day 3- **the mountain that is green year around, Mt. Carmel**: Haifa Navy Museum, Baha'i garden, Hecht Museum at Haifa University, Druze, then to Ein Hod artist village. Back to Dor. **Dor Nachsholim**

Friday, Oct 26--Day 4- **Tzipori, Nahalal**—the first moshav with home hospitality, Mt. Tabor, Kinneret cemetery, Tiberius, kibbutz hotel (Rabbi Adland will lead a little Kabbalat Shabbat service before dinner.) **Kfar Blum**

Saturday, Oct 27--Day 5-**Tel Hai yard**. Tel Dan walking through nature and Biblical Archaeological city. On to Nimrod castle, Pelter winery for lunch and wine, then an ATV ride around Marom Golan. End the day at the Hulla nature reserve. **Kfar Blum**

Sunday, Oct 28--Day 6- **Tzefat** art and Kabbalah, Shturman House Museum - Weingait story, Kibbutz Sde Eliahu- Orthodox kibbutz + Biotour, Kasar el Yahud—Jordan river crossing, first night Jerusalem. **Dan Boutique**

Monday, Oct 29--Day 7- Starting with the real old city of David followed by second Temple at the Davidson Center with a virtual model of the second Temple. We then join the Archaeological dig and sifting of the Temple Mt. remains. The day will end with a atv ride or Segway. Second night Jerusalem. **Dan Boutique**

Tuesday, Oct 30--Day 8- We are moving to the more modern city with the Tower of David Museum followed by a ramparts walk from Jaffa gate to Herods gate for a perspective view of the city.
