## A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

It is never too early to talk about October 2018. Sandy and I will be leading a trip to Israel guided by our good friend Doron Bookshtein. This trip is a bit different in that it is structured for people who may have been to Israel before, but it isn't exclusive to second timers. Any trip to Israel is worthwhile and no trip to Israel is comprehensive. You can never see everything unless you are there for an extended period of time, like a lifetime.

For example, at Yad vaShem, we won't be going through the main, powerful exhibit, but will have a seminar with someone from the Museum. We won't travel to Masada. Instead of the Israel Museum, we will go to the underused and, as Doron always reminds me, free and magnificent Rockefeller Museum. We will take some time to visit a few wineries in different parts of the country and sample some Israeli foods. We won't spend Shabbat in Jerusalem. Instead we will have Shabbat in the Galilee during one of the most beautiful times in Israel.

The trip begins in Tel Aviv on October 22 with a welcome dinner. We aren't organizing the travel arrangements because I've learned that some people want to travel early or stay late, and some people want to use points or miles on a variety of airlines. I can help people make their arrangements, but I've learned that people today are pretty savvy travelers. The trip will conclude with a farewell dinner on Nov 1, and for those leaving on the midnight non-stop flights back to New York, arrangements will be made to get you to the airport without any cause for concern.

This will be my 14<sup>th</sup> trip to Israel and the 8<sup>th</sup> tour that I've led. Each one has been different. Sometimes they've included the Negev and sometimes not. Every time we've been to Jerusalem, the holiest of cities. We usually go to the Golan, to Tzefat, a bit of time in Tel Aviv, and then it varies. We see new Israel. We see very old Israel. We walk paths the prophets walked and we visit places the most recent immigrants have built. We learn about the issues and conflicts and wars and attempts at peace. This tiny piece of ground is the center of so much that has happened in the world from thousands of years ago until today. We can never see it all, but we do get a taste of the life, food, the culture, the religion, and, of course, the politics.

Yes, it is a year away, but it is never too early to plan. If you aren't on my mailing list to go, then contact me at Temple and I will send you the itinerary. I won't even start looking for payments for several months, most likely after the first of the year, but mark your calendar—Oct 21-Nov 2, 2018 (that represents when you would need to leave and when you would return.)

**A Message from The President**

As I began to think about the topic for my bulletin article this month, a timeline photo popped up on my Facebook and I immediately knew what I wanted to write. Each year as I observe the High Holy Days I find myself reflecting about time; how quickly it passes sometimes; how slowly it drags at others. I think about my childhood and the new Rosh Hashana dress I got each year; I think about my "little boy" when he was excited to come to Temple and play football in the Spitzer's backyard on Rosh Hashana afternoon. I think about the way my observance and appreciation has grown for the annual "re-set" that follows a time of deep reflection and introspection.

This year, I also find myself thinking about the world around me and I was reminded of a youth group program that we did several decades ago when our Temple teens offered a program where we "Celebrated the Differences" among faith communities. The learning of that program was that we are actually more alike than different. We were reminded that a "good Jew," a "good Christian," a "good Muslim" were really just "good people" who shared values of respect, kindness, truthfulness and responsibility.

So today, as I began to write, a photo popped up of a poem that I kept on a bulletin board in my office when I worked for the Union for Reform Judaism. A co-worker had thought enough of it to photograph it and post it. I thought it was particularly fitting that it popped into the feed at this time of year.

People are often unreasonable, illogical and self-centered.  
*Forgive them anyway.*

If you are kind, people will accuse you of selfish, ulterior motives.  
*Be kind anyway.*

If you are successful, you will win some false friends and true enemies.  
*Succeed anyway.*

If you are honest and frank, people may cheat you;  
*Be honest and frank anyway.*

When you spend years building, someone could destroy overnight;  
*Build anyway.*

If you find serenity and happiness, they may be jealous  
*Be happy anyway.*

The good you do today, people will forget tomorrow;  
*Do good anyway.*

Give the world the best you have. And it may never be enough;  
*Give the world your best anyway.*

You see, in the final analysis, it is between you and God;  
*It never was between you and them anyway.*

While there was no attribution on the clipping that hung over my desk, I'm told that this is an adaptation of the Paradoxical Commandments by Dr. Kent M. Keith. It is often misattributed to Mother Teresa who is said to have had a different version of these words hanging on the wall in her home. Regardless of who first penned these thoughts, I think they are confirmation that we are indeed more alike than different.

I believe that our world is a better place when people are forgiving, kind, successful, honest and frank, builders who are happy doing good as they give their best to the world while keeping in mind "before whom we stand." (*Talmud B'rachot 28b*).

**Chadash, October 2017**

In Judaism, we do everything together. We attend synagogue in order to pray together, and in fact, there are some prayers that we must even have a *minyan* to recite. We celebrate Shabbat together, have Seders together and explore sacred text in our *chevruta*.

Ecclesiastes 4: 9-12 states:

*Two are better than one because they have a good return for their labor: If either of them falls down, one can help the other up. But pity anyone who falls and has no one to help them up. Also, if two lie down together, they will keep warm. But how can one keep warm alone? Though one may be overpowered, two can defend themselves. A cord of three strands is not quickly broken.*

Valuing our relationships is at the very core of our Jewish belief system and as the first day of Chadash unfolded this week, it was quite clear that a bond within

our *kehillah kedosha* (holy community) was beginning to form. Students who hadn't seen each other over the summer were interacting, and new friendships were blossoming. Parents came together for an informational meeting to learn about the new Chadash offerings, and our new Israeli *Shlichim*, Gili and Uri Hershkovitz, were warmly welcomed by all of the friendly faces in their new community.

It was a fantastic kick off to the beginning of the school year, and as the year continues, the ties of the Chadash *kehillah* will be further strengthened. With every family program, each *tefilah* morning service or concluding Chadash Havdalah service, at home family discussions and through the engaging classroom activities planned by each of the Chadash faculty, our community is nurtured and will continue to grow only proving that "two really are better than one."

It is exciting to observe this special community appreciating each other's company, and even as each of us show up as individuals, we each bring something unique to the table that helps to make Chadash a school we all can engage in and enjoy.

Hello everyone! It's a bright and way too hot Saturday afternoon here in Israel, and we (Gili and Uri) are sitting down thinking about our upcoming Shlichut with your community. We wanted to take this time to introduce ourselves so that you know a little bit about us when we arrive. In a funny turn of events, Uri is coming full-circle back to the US, as he lived in Cleveland as a child. Gili, on the other hand, has never lived abroad, so receiving the phone call from JAFI was very exciting for both of us. Knowing that we'll have a chance to be part of your community is heart-warming and something we are really looking forward to.

So, let each of us tell you about the other! Uri has made some very interesting choices throughout his life. After finishing four years of service in an intelligence military unit, Uri chose to start his B.Sc. in Physics at the Technion, Haifa. After a year, and a lot of soul-searching, he came to the conclusion that his passion is education, which wasn't surprising at all, in my opinion. As a teenager, Uri was a youth counsellor and counsellor-trainer in the "Hanoar Haoved" youth movement, and enjoyed every second of it. It

was only a matter of time until he pulled himself back on this track, which suits him well. Right now, Uri is finishing his B.A. in Education and Political Science with honours! In his spare time, he volunteers with children at risk and children with special needs.

We believe that open, honest conversation with an open heart and mind can bridge even the deepest of disagreements, and that at the end of the day, everybody loves ice cream. We plan on working hard to be a meaningful part of the community and are really excited to start. **Child Advocacy Program Sunday, October 15, 2017**

*Free and open to the community*

**Temple Israel Sisterhood and Brotherhood** will present a program on Sunday, October 15th at 10 a.m. featuring Sherri McKinney-Frantz, Program Administrator for the Children’s Network of Stark County.

Founded in 1987, the Children’s Network of Stark County Child Advocacy Center (The Network) is a community partnership of caring professionals working together in one location. They help children and their families cope with:

- **Exposure to violence**
- **Sexual abuse**
- **Severe physical abuse**
- **Human trafficking**

The Network offers comprehensive, coordinated, investigative and professional services. Treatment and aftercare services are also available to children and their non-offending family members. Over 13,000 children have been served. The Network was the first child advocacy center in the state of Ohio and is accredited by the National Children’s Alliance.

Ms. McKinney-Frantz, has dedicated her career to working with Stark County children and families who have experienced trauma. A strong child advocate, Sherri has been leading the Children’s Network of Stark County since October of 2014. Sherri enjoys leading teams and specializes in cutting-edge program development and expansion. She received her Bachelor of Social Work degree from the University of Cincinnati and earned her Master of Arts in Organizational Leadership from Malone University. Sherri is also a licensed social worker in the State of Ohio. Sherri and her husband, Larry, reside in Canton.
