A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

Abigail Pogrebin writes in her book "My Jewish Year," the following about the month of Elul:

Just as the month before the summer is the time when Americans go on crash diets, fearing how their bodies will look on the beach, so Elul, the month before Rosh Hashanah, became the time when Jews went on crash spiritual regimens fearing how their souls would look when they stood naked before God.

The month of Elul began on August 23rd and will end as we enter through the doors of the sanctuary on September 20th for Erev Rosh Hashanah. Elul is about preparation. If you are an observant Jew maybe you go to a service each night. If you are less observant, maybe you just do some spiritual stretching, warm ups, before the Holy Days arrive. This could be reading a meaningful book or taking time to review your past year or thinking about a new, stronger direction for the year to come. Though many Jews don't do any preparation before the Holy Days other than planning the meals, Judaism gives us an opportunity to truly turn inward and reflect.

For those who don't come to services often or maybe make their only appearance at the High Holy Days, walking into the most intense liturgical time of the year might feel overwhelming. To add to this intensity, this year we will use the Reform movement's new High Holy Day mahzor—Mishkan Hanefesh. Unlike Gates of Repentance (or the red prayer book), Mishkan Hanefesh invites you on the spiritual journey of the Holy Days, urging you to take time to think and explore life's journey in your hearts and souls and minds. In other words, the High Holy Days are not just about showing up, but about doing some spiritual work in preparation for the year to come.

I hope you find the new Mahzor worthwhile, but before you get to Erev Rosh Hashanah, take some time to think back over the past year. Make a list of accomplishments and never to forget moments and a list of those moments that were challenging. Then, make a second list of where you'd like to be in a year and what you can do to make it happen.

On behalf of my wife Sandy, Josh and Karen Adland, Rachel and Evan Silverland, Shana Tova u'metuka. May everyone have a year filled with goodness and sweetness.

Finally, please stay after the Erev Rosh Hashanah service for the oneg. Sandy and I are thrilled to host our congregational community, friends and guests as we celebrate 5778.

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A Message from The President

Millennials and technology often get a bad rap; many believe that technology has created a social divide rendering young people unable to carry on a face-to-face conversation. We hear how young people born between 1981 and 1996 are the first generation in history to have grown up totally immersed in a digital world. Often, Millennials are characterized as lazy, narcissistic and entitled selfie-lovers in addition to being well educated, global citizens who are entrepreneurial, collaborative and compassionate.

Millennials are not “joiners.” They typically prefer to pay as they go and 35% of the age group identified themselves as religious “nones” in the 2015 Pew Research study. Many Jewish children identify as “just Jewish” and not with a specific denomination. They have adopted the prevailing attitude that organized religion, and synagogues, are “irrelevant to their life.”

On the surface, this is alarming especially to those who work to sustain the synagogue for the generations to come. It is true, that our children and grandchildren are not looking for the synagogue of their parents’ and grandparents’ generations; however, a characteristic of this generation is to treasure meaning and purpose in their work and in their relationships.

I am inspired by the ways that Jewish young people find and sustain community; how they make meaning and how they bravely advocate for the people and things about which they are passionate. I want to tell you a story.

There is a man in his early 30s who has dealt with more hardship in his life than many of us twice his age. He was very young when his father died and eight years ago he came home to find his mother dead. He is estranged from his only brother and has multiple serious health issues. Two years ago, he was declared legally blind and he has mobility issues. He is now homeless because his landlord needed his apartment for a family member.

Feeling desperate, he posted a message on Facebook asking if anyone had a floor he could sleep on until a bed opened in a local shelter. Fast forward a few days; a friend immediately offered the floor but the steps proved to be too much; the shelters in the city where he lives are typically not accessible either so his community kicked into gear. A go-fund-me was set up to provide money for emergency housing. The first \$1000 was raised in a matter of hours. In addition to providing much needed funds, people jumped in to connect him with physical and occupational therapists, medical professionals and service agencies. Together these young people have found a way to keep him safe, help him on a path to self-sufficiency and boost his spirits.

He wrote an update recently saying that he was humbled to learn that people still remembered him; that there was still a modicum of love for him. “It has been an inspiration and the motivation that I truly needed to pull myself up from this very bottom of the barrel... The struggles continue though... I am confident in working with different people and different organizations that I'll be able to figure this out.”

I spoke to him today; he spoke of how he's never been a person with his hand out, that he always saw himself as a leader. I assured him that by having the courage to say he needed help, he was indeed a leader. It is so hard to ask for help; yet this man recognized that he couldn't do it by himself. I told him I was never more proud of him or of his community. Ten years have passed since he was regularly connected to these people, but they haven't forgotten him or each other. This isn't the first time I've seen these supposedly “entitled selfie-lovers” run into the fire.

Millennials may not join synagogues or practice Judaism as we do, but they live the values of Judaism that the generations before them tried to teach and model. It's a lesson for all of us.

Child Advocacy Program Sunday, October 15, 2017

Free and open to the community

Temple Israel Sisterhood and Brotherhood will present a program on Sunday, October 15th at 10 a.m. featuring Sherri McKinney-Frantz, Program Administrator for the Children's Network of Stark County.

Founded in 1987, the Children's Network of Stark County Child Advocacy Center (The Network) is a community partnership of caring professionals working together in one location. They help children and their families cope with:

- ***Exposure to violence***
- ***Severe physical abuse***
- ***Sexual abuse***
- ***Human trafficking***

The Network offers comprehensive, coordinated, investigative and professional services. Treatment and aftercare services are also available to children and their non-offending family members. Over 13,000 children have been served. The Network was the first child advocacy center in the state of Ohio and is accredited by the National Children's Alliance.

Ms. McKinney-Frantz, has dedicated her career to working with Stark County children and families who have experienced trauma. A strong child advocate, Sherri has been leading the Children's Network of Stark County since October of 2014. Sherri enjoys leading teams and specializes in cutting-edge program development and expansion. She received her Bachelor of Social Work degree from the University of Cincinnati and earned her Master of Arts in Organizational Leadership from Malone University. Sherri is also a licensed social worker in the State of Ohio. Sherri and her husband, Larry, reside in Canton.

Who Is Wise

In the *Pirkei Avot* 4:1, Ben Zoma writes, "Who is wise? He who learns from all people." Over the last several weeks, we have been busy at Chadash hiring our teachers for the school year, putting together our curricula and finalizing so many details to bring the children the most enriching experience we possibly can.

Our teachers are prepared. They enthusiastically have been embracing each classroom's field of study and have already begun to fashion lesson plans that are both engaging and educational.

The fact is, each of the Chadash teachers are unique and special in their own way and so very dedicated. They will do an excellent job of bringing the Torah and its teachings to life and instilling its values to the Chadash student body.

Ben Zoma, however, did not write, "Who is wise? He who learns from his teachers." Ben Zoma made it clear that learning takes place from all people.

This year at Chadash, one of the main areas of focus that we will stress is the importance of not just student learning, but of family learning as a whole. We want our families to go home after religious school and continue with discussions inspired by the topics their children learned in class. We want our families to pray together and to celebrate holidays together.
