A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

November 6th is voting day. Voting, to me, is a responsibility of being a citizen of this country. It is also a right we should not take for granted. I have been voting since I turned 18 in 1972. I was part of that first generation of 18-year-old voters. A table was set up in our high school cafeteria, and we waited for our turn to fill out the voter registration card. I've never missed voting in an election since. Sometimes, I voted absentee when I lived in Israel. I voted absentee from college. I voted in presidential election years, off year elections, and off off year elections. Once, living in Indianapolis, I even went to my polling place on the first Tuesday of the month only to find that there wasn't anything to vote for—the polling place wasn't open.

Every election is important, but for many reasons, interest in this year's election seems to be higher than other years. I don't need to detail for you the division our country is going through and the passion that people are bringing to their candidates. The stakes are high for the movement on immigration reform and border security, trade, gender rights, taxes, social security, health care and more. In Ohio, there is a senate election and a gubernatorial election, as well as the state legislature and a Constitutional Amendment known as Issue 1. Your vote can make the difference.

The Jewish community tends to vote at a higher rate than the rest of our nation. I believe that this stems from the centuries of living under the rule of others with no say in our self-determination. We were at the whims of kings and cardinals and generals with little recourse. When we weren't needed anymore, or the leaders needed to make an example, we were persecuted or driven away. As Jews, our voice, needs, and desires meant nothing. We were expendable.

When we came to this country and became citizens, our voices counted, and our votes mattered. The Jewish community tended to vote their conscience over their pocket book. We leaned left and voted with the Democratic party. It still seems that many Jews vote Democrat, but it isn't 90% or 80%, but more like 70%. There are many reasons for the shift, but I want to remain non-partisan in my writing so as not to side with one party over another. Let me add this—at one time, the two parties tried to work across the aisle, tried to be more moderate, tried to get things done. Right now, this isn't the case, and the fabric of our society is being torn apart. We need leaders who don't just give lip service to working with the opposition, but who will really do it. We can't afford this internal destruction any longer. You need to figure this out for yourselves. When voting is a strong option, sitting home and doing nothing is not taking your right and responsibility seriously.

Vote on Nov. 6th —exercise your duty as a citizen.

Prophetic Power & Politics: How Reform Jews Can Create a More Just World (and make sense of the recent elections...)

"Rabbi Pesner will tell the inspiring story of the historic decision by the Reform Movement to launch the Religious Action Center nearly sixty years ago at the peak of the Civil Rights Movement. Teaching Gratitude

With Thanksgiving upon us this month, it is a perfect opportunity to bring to mind the Jewish value of *Samayach B'chelko* or being happy with one's lot.. In the Pirkei Avot 4:1, Ben Zoma said, "Who is rich? Those who are happy with their portion."

We are blessed in Canton to have such a caring Jewish community, and our Chadash students have so many amazing role models.

Tips for Parents on Teaching Children Gratitude

1. Work gratitude into your daily conversation
2. Find a goodwill project
3. Encourage generosity
4. Insist on thank you notes
5. Practice saying no
6. Be patient (Gratitude doesn't happen overnight.)



**Learn about the Ethiopian Jewish Holiday of Sigd
Wednesday, November 7, 7:00 p.m.**

Our shaliach, Mor Roffe, will teach us about the Ethiopian Jewish holiday of Sigd. Sigd is a holiday of the Ethiopian Jewish community, known as "Beta Israel". The name of the holiday is derived from the Hebrew word for prostration, "sgida".

During Sigd, which is celebrated on the 29th of the Hebrew month of Heshvan – 50 days after Yom Kippur (similar to the holiday of Shavuot, celebrated 50 days after Passover), the community marks the renewal of the covenant between the Jewish people, God and His Torah. On Sigd, Ethiopian Jews pray to God and plead to return to Zion.

Today, since most members of the Ethiopian Jewish community have made Aliyah to the State of Israel, during the holiday, members of the community travel to Jerusalem and visit the Wailing Wall and the promenade in the city's "Armon Hanatziv" neighborhood. The holiday serves as an annual gathering of the entire Ethiopian community, and its members view it as an opportunity to strengthen the

connection with their roots and culture.

We're excited to announce Temple Israel's involvement in an Adopt-A-Room project for **The Family Living Center Homeless Shelter**. For \$50 a month, we have "adopted" a room for the next 12 months, which helps pay the expenses of maintaining the room. The shelter provides up to 90 days of emergency housing for Stark County homeless families and single women. They have one floor of a previous hotel, which provides 16 rooms for families, a kitchen, living room, kids' play room, tutoring center, and laundry room. They are offered supportive services such as counseling, job training, employment assistance, savings program, and housing assistance. As part of the "adopting" the room, we will provide volunteers to clean the room to get it ready for the next family. We will also be providing "care packages" for each new family that includes; towels, washcloths, toothbrush, toothpaste, deodorant, soap, shampoo, conditioner, lotion, and other hygiene items.
