A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

In October, I will be leading a small trip to Israel. Though I have no plans to lead another one, sometimes you never know. I look forward to listening to my friend, my guide, my teacher, Doron Bookshtein, deepen my knowledge about this important country which holds a special and unique place in the heart of many Jews. This is my 7th or 8th trip with Doron. Each one is a bit different, not only because we see some different things, but the nature of Israel continues to evolve, develop and change. It certainly isn't the emerging country that it was back in 1971, when I went for the first time. Today Israel is technologically advanced, more crowded, more involved in the world, still worrying about security, still dealing with the problems all countries do from hunger to homelessness to unemployment to health issues to working with minorities and more. You see all of this in Israel, but you are also seeing Jews, some religious and some not, living as Jews without the fear of being persecuted because they are Jews. There are no pogroms or expulsions of Jews. We can celebrate our Judaism openly.

Lest we think that all is perfect in Israel, we should think again. Personally, I struggle with the current right-wing government and its lack of investment in trying to find a path to peace. At the same time, I don't see any move from those attacking Israel to find a peaceful solution either. It is a terrible stalemate.

The situation at the Kotel (the Western Wall) and the Women of the Wall is deeply disturbing to me. The Orthodox movement has sanctified this space as Orthodox sacred, leaving little room for people who aren't Orthodox to find sacred space. The Orthodox rabbis in charge of overseeing the day-to-day operations at the Kotel have turned this space into a sanctuary which it never was. Non-Orthodox Jews can't celebrate or offer prayers in an egalitarian setting and women who monthly come to celebrate Rosh Chodesh have their prayers drowned out by whistles and shouts. These women are physically attacked and if they are carrying a Torah it is even worse. No wonder the secular Jewish world has no use for the Kotel and only visit if they have to go.

Liberal Judaism in general (anything outside of Orthodox) continues to fight for its existence and recognition. I am not sure why the Orthodox Jewish world thinks that Liberal/Progressive Judaism is a threat to them. We aren't. We observe Judaism differently. We understand what it means to be and live as a Jew differently.

Despite the struggles, I can't wait to get back and feel the country under my feet, eat a delicious falafel, and just enjoy the sights and sounds of Israel.

Basic Judaism and Introduction to Hebrew

Rabbi Adland will be teaching a Basic Judaism class on Wednesday evenings at 6:30 PM beginning November 7th. The class will run 10 sessions, finishing January 30th. The Introduction to Hebrew class will begin on February 6th.

The Basic Judaism class will cover a brief overview of Jewish history, a look at life cycles and holidays, as well as a bit of liturgy, theology, and Reform Judaism. Each class will last about 90 minutes. The cost for the class is \$36, which helps defray the cost of materials and books. Sign up for the class must be done by October 30th. A minimum of 5 students is needed for the class.

The Introduction to Hebrew class will begin on February 6th, take a short break while the rabbi is away, and then 9 more sessions. The objective of the class is to teach the student the alef-bet, vowels, and how to read words. The cost for this class is \$36 as well. Sign up for the class must be done by January 22nd. A minimum of 5 students is needed for the class.

Preparation is Key

At the conclusion of Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret arrives, and we say a prayer for rain in hopes of a great harvest next year. We continue adding this prayer to the *Musaf* until Passover arrives, as these are the preparations G-d laid out for us in order to ensure in our own success.

Preparation is something that follows us throughout our Jewish calendar. We prepare each week for Shabbat as we light the candles and say the Kiddush, prepare holiday feasts and celebrations with special recipes and rituals, and even prepare ourselves as we pray each day as we put on *kippot* or *tallit*.

Preparation is what makes each of our rituals special, and this is something that we all work together on in our Chadash community. Our Hebrew students are learning the language from our homeland in hopes that they will one day have a Bar of Bat Mitzvah, and all of our students study the commandments in our Torah to learn to be a *mensch* and a one day a leader in our community.

This year, our youngest students will make preparations for the first formal step of their Jewish education. They will learn to say the central Jewish prayer, the *Shema*, which will connect them to the concept of one G-d. This will lay the groundwork for all the learning that is ahead of them as they fulfill the celebration of Consecration on December 9, 2018. This year's Consecration will be celebrated alongside with our family Hanukkah party, as together we rejoice in the miracle of the oil and the heroic actions of the Maccabees.

We all make preparations throughout each step of our lives, and in doing so it is with certainty that we will have positive outcomes. This is a message that is essential to pass along to the Chadash students, so as Shemini Atzeret comes, we encourage our families to share how a prayer for rain can be a call to action. Each step leads to the next one, and this one prayer on this one holiday leads to a great harvest further down the line and a most excellent reward for all the people it reaches.

Prophetic Power & Politics: How Reform Jews Can Create a More Just World (and make sense of the recent elections...)

**November 8, 2018, at 7:00 p.m.
at Beit Ha'am**

“Rabbi Pesner will tell the inspiring story of the historic decision by the Reform Movement to launch the Religious Action Center nearly sixty years ago at the peak of the Civil Rights Movement. He will lay out the compelling challenges we continue to confront as we seek a world of wholeness, justice and peace, given the rise in white supremacy and bigotry. He will deal with racial disparities, voting rights, mass incarceration, and more. He will describe the challenges that vulnerable communities are confronting, and he also will reflect on the political polarization in our culture and the need to honor diverse perspectives and find common ground around shared values. Since Rabbi Pesner will be speaking shortly after the mid-term elections, he will offer some analysis and lay out opportunities going forward. He will close with a call to action, with concrete steps we can take as individuals, as a congregation, and as a movement for Tikkun Olam.”



Rabbi Jonah Dov Pesner serves as the Director of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism. He has led the Religious Action Center since 2015. Rabbi Pesner also serves as Senior Vice President of the Union for Reform Judaism, a position to which he was appointed to in 2011. Named one of the most influential rabbis in America by *Newsweek* magazine, he is an inspirational leader and tireless advocate for social justice.

Rabbi Pesner’s work has focused on encouraging Jewish communities to reach across lines of race, class, and faith in campaigns for social justice. In 2006, he founded Just Congregations (now incorporated into the Religious Action Center), which engaged clergy, professional, and volunteer leaders in interfaith efforts in pursuit of social justice. Rabbi Pesner was a primary leader in the successful Massachusetts campaign for health care access that has provided health care coverage to hundreds of thousands and which became a nationwide model for reform. Over the course of his career, he has also led and supported campaigns for racial justice, economic opportunity, immigration reform, LGBTQ equality, human rights, and a variety of other causes. He is dedicated to building bridges to collectively confront anti-Semitism, Islamophobia, and other forms of hate and bigotry.

Rabbi Pesner has trained and mentored students on all four campuses of the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, and gives speeches in interfaith and secular venues all over the world. Rabbi Pesner serves as a board member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights, JOIN for Justice, the National Religious Partnership for the Environment, and the New England Center for Children. He is a member of the Leadership Team for the Jewish Social Justice Roundtable. He has served as a scholar for the Wexner Foundation, American Jewish World Service, the Nexus USA Summit, and Combined Jewish Philanthropies, among others.

Ordained at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in 1997, Rabbi Pesner was a congregational rabbi at Temple Israel in Boston and at Temple Israel in Westport, Conn. A graduate of Wesleyan University and the Bronx High School of Science, Rabbi Pesner is married to Dana S. Gershon, an attorney. They have four daughters: Juliet, Noa, Bobbie, and Cate.
