A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

I thought I was going to write an article on Chanukah, which begins Sunday evening Dec. 2, but after having returned from a wonderful trip to Israel and now seeing the hundreds of rockets being fired at Israel by Hamas, my intent has changed. Every day for the last few weeks, Hamas has fired destructive and deadly missiles at the communities near the Gaza strip. There have been injuries and even casualties. What we forget is that the residents and their children of these border communities end up spending their nights in shelters afraid of being killed. Israel retaliates, but the world shakes its finger at them. It appears to be okay for Hamas to reign terror down on Israel, but not for Israel to defend itself.

Ever since Israel evacuated the Gaza strip and Hamas gained power over the people, the border communities to Gaza have lived in fear. Hamas abused the world's support by spending aid money on building terror tunnels (Israel now has technology to find these tunnels) instead of building Gaza's infrastructure of hospitals, roads, schools, and support institutions. Then Hamas, in desperation from its own failures, launches attacks on Israel and Israel retaliates by bombing Hamas and trying to destroy the missile launchers. A cease-fire will be called, the world will wring its hands over the poor Palestinians plight, money will pour in and it all starts again. Who gets the blame? Israel. Why? Because she is seen as an aggressor and not a defender of her people's sovereign right to exist.

This scenario is getting old, but not sufficiently for Hamas. If Hamas would care more about its own people maybe change would come, but she doesn't care. Martyrs are better than teaching kids in school and taking care of the sick in a hospital or clean water and fuel for heating.

It is amazing traveling around Israel, but it would have been a bit different had we been there this week. We went to some places in the south of Israel that have been impacted by missiles. Yes, Iron Dome destroys many of them in the sky, but not all; and don't be fooled, these rockets are deadly, just not accurate.

I am sure that the powers that be will have this under control by the time Chanukah begins, but a price will be paid by all parties involved. There will be death and destruction, yelling and screaming, complaining and blaming. Nothing will really be solved, and the next round won't be far off. Until Hamas changes the way it wants to help its people, this scenario is just doomed to repeat itself again and again.

A Message from The President

In early November, Temple Israel hosted an evening with the distinguished speaker Rabbi Jonah Pesner, Director of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism. With thanks to Shelley Schweitzer, we were able to schedule an evening with Rabbi Pesner in Canton.

Originally, Rabbi Pesner was to speak primarily about mid-term elections and to analyze and make sense of the outcomes. Due to the horrific event at the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh on October 27th, the purpose and topic of the evening changed.

Instead of discussing the recent elections, we were once again confronted with the issue of hatred and bigotry. This time it was not words or threats but the worst kind of action, murder. A lone gunman took it upon himself to devastate as many lives as he could. Because the Tree of Life Synagogue was actively involved with the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society (HIAS), the shooter felt it was his duty to take action.

Instead of being an evening for Temple Israel, it became a community-wide event. Candles were lit to honor the memories of the 11 individuals who lost their lives. Religious leaders from many other faiths came to light candles and show their support for the Jewish community. Many others from the greater Canton community also attended. Sadly, it usually takes a catastrophe to bring so many diverse groups together with the same goal, social justice.

An effective way to help bring about social justice is for faith or community-based groups to work together. Divergent groups do not have to agree on every issue. Find a common shared interest and pursue your dream together. If done effectively, you may exact social change.

Rabbi Pesner's work focuses on encouraging communities to reach across lines of race, class and faith in campaigns for social justice. Reaching across lines may involve stepping outside ones comfort zone. That is a small price to pay for the greater good for our country.

The World Stands on Three Things

According to Jewish law, the world stands on three things – on Torah, on worship, and on loving deeds. (*Pirkei Avot* 1:2) On Sunday, December 9, 2018, these are the principles we hope to pass along to the Chadash Consecration class. They will be standing on the *bimah* to commemorate the beginning of their Jewish learning as they recite the *Shema* and are blessed by our clergy.

Typically, a Consecration ceremony occurs at the end of the high holy day season on Simchat Torah, but this year, the 2018 Consecration class will celebrate this important lifecycle event during Hanukkah. It feels only apropos that this holy moment happens on the day when we complete reading our sacred Torah and roll it back up to the beginning to start it all over again and parade around to joyously share its importance. If we are trying to convey the three things on which the world stands, Simchat Torah seems to cover all of them.

Hanukkah, however, reminds us of a different message. There is the message that even with an underdog (The Maccabees), goodness will prevail. There is the message that miracles can happen when we show our faith in G-d. There is a message that we retell the stories of our people so we can remember and learn from them.

In Judaism, we are always learning. We are, after all, the people of the book, and learning is an essential ingredient to our tradition. There is good reason why the beginning of our Jewish learning is marked with such a special moment, and pairing this moment with Hanukkah illustrates some wonderful lessons of its own.

We will celebrate our Consecrants with a Hanukkah-themed reception immediately following the ceremony. As we eat our latkes, we will remember the oil that lasted for 8 days and allowed the Jewish people to clean up their Temple destroyed by the Greeks which enabled them to restore their place of worship. We want our Consecrants to love and respect their own place of worship as Beit Ha'am is, and should be, their home away from home.

These traditions are only the beginning for the 2018 Consecration class, and there are so many lessons for them to learn ahead. We are overjoyed that they will do so in Canton and look forward to watching them grow. *Mazal tov* to the Consecrants and their families and Happy Hanukkah to all!

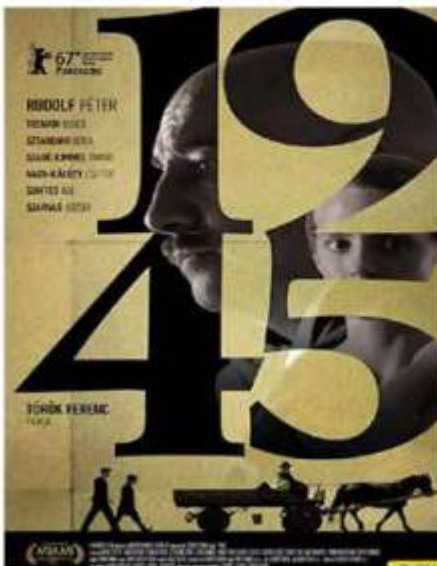
