A Message from Rabbi Jon Adland

I really have no idea of the exact number of bulletin articles I've written over the last 37 years, but my best guess is around 360 give or take. At one time the rabbi's column in the bulletin was an important place to communicate ideas, issues, concerns, as well as to motivate participation and engagement.

These days, with electronic communication and the delay from the time I write the article until it is published, can seem like an eternity. Still, writing my bulletin articles encourages me to pause, peek down the road as to what is coming, and then say a few things.

This is the last one. Yes, it is a strange feeling, but one I've known was coming for a while. On June 21st, at the service following the annual meeting and Shabbat dinner, I will have more to say about my yesterday, today, and tomorrow. I hope that you will have the time to come that evening. So let me use this final column to say a few things about Reform Judaism, Israel, and the future.

Reform Judaism is ever evolving. Today's Reform Judaism certainly isn't the Reform Judaism of my great grandfather and grandfather in Lincoln, NE or my mother in Washington, DC, but in many ways, it is still the same. Reform Judaism was not meant to be stagnant. It was designed to meet the spiritual needs of liberal, progressive Jews in every age. We look at rituals and bring new meaning to them. We look at Torah and understand it in light of the world around us. We are not meant to live in 18th century Russia and live Jewish lives as our ancestors did, or 15th century Poland or 13th century Germany. In every generation, Jews have asked themselves how they can make Jewish life better and more meaningful. Progressive Jews just made it the mantra of Jewish life. The only way Reform Judaism will continue is if we take it seriously and engage in it with modernity by embracing the new and progressive ideas coming to the surface every day.

I am a Zionist. I believe that Israel has a right to exist within secure borders. I believe the Jewish people should have a homeland because in too many times in too many places, we have suffered dramatically. I also believe in the two-state solution because without it there will never be peace. I believe that every Jew should make every effort possible to travel to Israel as this place is holy ground in our people's journey. I believe that Israel should be a religiously pluralistic society with no one group holding power over another. Israel is complicated on so many levels and sometimes I disagree, but I will not stop loving Israel. I am a Zionist.

A Message from the President

We've had the privilege of having Jon Adland serve as the Rabbi of Temple Israel for the past eight years. He came to us from Indianapolis, but his life has been an amazing Jewish journey over the years.

He grew up in Chevy Chase, Maryland and attended Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School. During those years, he discovered a fondness for summer camp. He attended Kamp Kewanee where he received the nickname of "Moose". He also attended URJ camp OSRUI in Wisconsin. The camping experience had a significant impact on his decision to become a rabbi.

Jon attended Washington University in St. Louis, and during his undergraduate days, he studied abroad in Israel. He then went to Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati. While at HUC, he went to his friend David's wedding in Louisiana, where he met the love of his life, Sandy. That summer Jon served as a Unit Head at Henry S. Jacobs camp in Utica Mississippi where Sandy was a counselor. They were married July 5, 1981 in Baton Rouge, and in 1982, he was ordained.

If you speak to Jon about his career, you'll find he spent time in many different places, especially as a student rabbi while at HUC. His career though, has found him primarily in three different places: Indianapolis, Indiana; Lexington, Kentucky; and Canton, Ohio.

After being ordained, he spent four years as an assistant Rabbi at Indianapolis Hebrew Congregation. In 1986, they moved to Lexington, where he served as Rabbi of Temple Adath Israel for 17 years. During those years, two wonderful children were born. Josh in Indianapolis in 1984, and Rachel in Lexington in 1989. In 2003, he returned to the Indianapolis Hebrew Congregation as Senior Rabbi through 2010.

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During his life, he has held three important jobs: rabbi, husband, and father, and at the end of the day, family was always the number one priority. As the children grew up, he always found quality time to spend with them. Somedays it was making them breakfast, others at dinner, and also sharing in their activities.

Jon’s values reflect Reform Judaism. Jon might say the words of Torah are a guide for how to live your life, in a God-inspired way. Through Interfaith programs, Rabbi Adland has worked to remove many of the stumbling blocks of diversity. Respect for each other and understanding others’ beliefs can help accomplish many goals together. Those goals are achieved through programs Jon has actively supported like Habitat for Humanity, Coming Together Stark County, the MLK Commission & Shabbat, Planned Parenthood, Thanksgiving Baskets, and many more. Through Interfaith, he has made inroads in creating a better world where equality for all has taken steps forward.

Jon is a teacher at his core and loves to share what he knows. He prides himself on the bonds he has formed with his students and is honored when former students ask him to officiate at their lifecycle events. He also believes that Jewish camping is very important in shaping Jewish identity. Look what it did for him.

I would be remiss if I didn’t mention his passion for woodworking. He still attends camp as a student to sharpen his woodworking skills. He is one of the few Jewish men I would trust with a power tool. He also has a special fondness for fishing.

While in Kentucky, he received an award called the Kentucky Colonel. It’s the highest title of honor bestowed by the Governor of Kentucky to those who are unwavering in devotion to faith, family, commonwealth, and country. That is a reflection of his life.

So yes, Jon will be missed, but we can look on the bright side (as Jon would do), even though we are losing a rabbi, we are gaining a Rabbi Emeritus. Thanks for eight great years my friend.

The Value of a Teacher

Another Chadash school year came to a close on May 5, 2019, and at our closing *Siyum* assembly, we gave special recognition to our Chadash faculty. As I am writing this article, it is the secular teacher appreciation week in our country, and Facebook posts about national store-wide discounts for teachers, cute meme quotes, and photographs of personal favorite teachers are popping up all throughout my news feed.

The work of a teacher is so endearing, so profound, and so awe-inspiring that it conjures up images of Avenger type superheroes shaping the minds of the future leaders of tomorrow. One meme I saw summed it up best. Superman is sitting at a desk with a teacher in her classroom and asks, “What’s your super power?” The teacher answers, “I can take a classroom of kids dealing with issues at home and engage and help them in a distracted world.” It seems like an impossible and daunting task, but for a teacher, this is the type of task that is a reality and that is often required of them.

At Chadash, our teachers see our students once each week for only 2-1/2 hours at a time, and yet somehow, they build relationships with each of them and do the best that they can to create meaningful experiences that will impact their lives all through a Jewish lens and examples from our ancient leaders. The biggest lessons come to our students only through 5 books that are taught to them over and over again from the time they are preschoolers all the way through their 10th grade year in high school.

These subject matters from the 5 books in the *Torah* are reinvented each year in order to be age appropriate and engaging, and it is the work of our teachers that delivers this magic.

As the summer is now upon us, and the Chadash faculty is recharging their minds and souls for the next school year, I want to thank them for all of the effort and heart-felt kindness they put into their job each time Chadash comes together. It is nothing short of heroic, and I am grateful that I get to share in all of this amazing work. Chadash faculty, Superman has nothing on you.
