A few weeks ago, we were at Temple for Friday night services - Rabbi Adland led the service, and it was nice to see he had not forgotten too much in his 5 weeks of retirement. During his sermon, he spoke of the marking of time and some of the congregation spoke of where they were when significant events took place – specifically when Neil Armstrong walked on the moon. We also discussed other significant events such as Woodstock, the Challenger explosion, and others. I remembered where I was when I saw or heard about all of these events, including President Kennedy’s assassination – the playground at Edgefield Elementary school.

The 50th anniversary of the moon landing has sparked a lot of this type of discussion recently. Fifty years ago, our country was fighting an unpopular war in Southeast Asia, and we were in a cold war with Russia. We were certainly in a different time, and frankly, we needed some good news. We needed a win. The Apollo 11 mission certainly provided that. The country came together in a positive way to celebrate what seemed like an impossible accomplishment.

While it was a much different time in our country 50 years ago, there are many things that are the same. We certainly had many things that divided us as a nation in the sixties and to say we are a divided country today would be an understatement. The issues are different but the division seems deeper and more acrimonious than in the sixties. Maybe it is just my perspective that makes it seem that way. I know I do not look at things the same way as I did 50 years ago. Some of this change in perspective comes with age and gaining some wisdom over the years – although the wisdom part could be debated by some. Personally speaking, I believe much of this change in my perspective can be attributed to Judaism. One of the things that made Judaism appealing to me was it provides a road map on how to live a good life and how to treat people. Treating others as you would like to be treated, welcoming the stranger, seem like simple concepts but as a nation, we are struggling with these basic human decencies.

We need something good to happen. We need a win. We need not to be brought together by a tragedy – we have had enough of those – but by something positive. What that win will be, I do not know. But maybe, just maybe, we can each do our part to try to get us that win. We can all reflect on what Torah teaches us and reach out to the stranger and welcome them and treat others with a little more decency. I know I am a better person than I was 50 years ago, and I hope to be a better person tomorrow than I am today. If we all strive for that, we can bring people together and get our win.

A Message from the President

In our prayerbook, the Mishkan T'filah, on page 258 there is a prayer "For Our Country." In this prayer, there is a passage that reads, "Grant our leaders wisdom and forbearance. May they govern with justice and compassion. Help us to appreciate one another."

In the Conservative prayerbook, Siddur Lev Shalem, there is also "A Prayer for Our Country." There is a passage that reads, "Plant love and companionship, peace and friendship, among the many peoples and faiths who dwell in our nation. Grant us the knowledge to judge justly, the wisdom to act with compassion, and the understanding and courage to root out poverty from our land."

When I hear the phrase, America is the greatest nation in the world, I wonder if they read the above paragraphs (or any facsimile). We are a nation with so much potential, yet instead of freedom and justice for all, we currently seem to echo divisiveness and polarization. How do we begin to heal?

In 1787, at the Constitutional Convention, there were 5 contentious issues which needed to be resolved. They varied from representation, voting, slavery, citizenship, and commerce. Without resolution of these issues, who knows what our constitution would look like, what enabled our country to move forward (not every step of the way was pleasant) was compromise. Give a little, get a little.

We live in a 2-party political system. Both parties need each other. They need to respect each other and their beliefs, no matter how hideous they may seem. No one wants a ONE party system.

To make things work, COMPROMISE! If each side were to apply the essence of "Prayer for Our Country," maybe compromise could work.

Let's begin with, when tragedy strikes our country, asking yourself what you can do to make the pain go away.

One customary Jewish Rosh Hashanah tradition of the new year is to sharpen our taste buds and try a new fruit that we have never tasted before. We use this opportunity to say the *Shehechyanu*, our prayer that brings significance to all things we do for the first time. It is said that we eat the new fruit on the second night of the holiday in order to bring a newness to the second day as well.

This concept of creating a fresh outlook is something that we strive to do each and every week of Chadash. We aim for *Shehechyanu* moments yearlong to keep our students’ Jewish education fun and engaging.

As Chadash’s new year is about to unfold this month, along with it comes new teacher assignments, a new mix of students in the classrooms, and some new curriculum. Perhaps one of our biggest changes this year is that Chadash veteran religious school teacher, *Morah* (teacher) Ellen Shankle is taking over the preschool Torah Tots classroom. She has worked hard all summer long to redesign the classroom with some new furniture and small manipulative toys funded by Temple Israel.

Moreh Daniel Silverman will be working with students in 4th-7th grade on newly designed curriculum of teaching about Biblical Israel and the Diaspora, and *Morah* Kristin Wilkof will be working with 8th and 9th graders on comparative religion and social action. *Morah* Linda Poole returns to teach our 1st-3rd graders about Bible stories, and *Morah* Lori Magill comes back to us as the Hebrew Through Movement specialist, a curriculum created by the Jewish Education Center of Cleveland and brought to Chadash last year.

Chadash Hebrew school also returns with our self-paced *Mitkadem* curriculum taught by *Morah* Laura Solomon and *Morah* Ellen Shankle.

New beginnings are inspiring, and from all of us at Chadash, we wish you and yours a *L’shanah Tovah!*

Temple Israel Habitat Crew

This is the fourth summer that members of Temple Israel’s Habitat Crew have gone into new homes being built for just one day and worked hard. Our next work day is at a different home. During the first two years, beginning in 2016, we did a variety of jobs from installing baseboard to hanging doors to punch list items such as installing door hardware or putting up towel racks, etc. The last two years, the Temple Habitat Crew has primarily focused on hanging doors, door trim, window trim, floor registers, and closet doors. We have gotten quite proficient at our job, so much so that in August we finished our work in a three-bedroom home by noon. Though a few people have come once or twice, the main crew consists of Mike Abrams, Mark Atleson, Ron Gelb, Steve Manello, Shelley Schweitzer, Vito Sinopoli, Rabbi Spitzer, and me—Rabbi Adland. I coordinate the effort by getting people to sign up for the various dates—there are 7 working dates that are all on Thursdays from 8:30 AM to 2:30 PM unless we finish early—and sending out email reminders. The homes are mostly in Canton, though we’ve worked on a few homes in Massillon.

This is a great Social Action project. You don’t have to have any skills in woodworking or carpentry. We will teach you what to do, and by the end of the day, you will be “proficient” in that skill. The only thing you need to bring to the effort is the willingness to learn and work. We still have room for workers on the following days: Oct. 3 and 31, Nov. 21, and Dec. 12. Please contact me at j.adland@gmail.com if you are interested this year or maybe something you want to consider for the future. We are building homes for families who are grateful and ready to be homeowners.

The Social Justice Alliance held their second meeting on August 13th at Temple Israel. All three sub-committees have been hard at work with discussions and action plans for their topic. Below is a summary of their reports.

Immigration - Chaired by Barb Ferne and Rita Schaner

1. Important to understand the Jewish perspective
2. Education needed on US Laws & History
 - a. Guest Speaker
 - b. "The Traveling Suitcase," an educational program distributed through the National Museum of American Jewish History in Philadelphia.
3. Several Temple members participated in the #CloseTheCamps vigil at Suburban Temple in Beachwood on August 11th. Provided a script and how to contact Congress members.

Gun Violence - Chaired by Liza Grossman - Joan Ortman provided review

1. Education
 - a. Walsh University Program on Gun Violence - Rabbi Spitzer is one of the speakers. Dates are 11/6, 11/13, and 11/19. After the series, there will be a 4th meeting inviting Temple Community along with other local organizations for further discussion and action plans.
2. Gathering statistics
3. Visual piece
4. School issues

Women's Rights - Chaired by Courtney Johnson-Benson

The group has four major emphases:

1. Domestic Violence
 - a. Representative from Domestic Violence Project spoke at first meeting.
2. Reproductive Rights
 - a. Speaker from Planned Parenthood at next meeting August 26th.
3. Women's Rights in the Workplace
4. Education

Rabbi Lindsey Danzinger from RAC Ohio attended the meeting via video conference. She shared what RAC Ohio is doing on these issues and offered ideas on how to proceed. RAC Ohio is sponsoring a Lobby Day on November 13th at the Columbus State House, and we're hoping Temple Israel will be able to send a group to Lobby.

Temple Israel had 16 members participate in the #CloseTheCamps vigil on Immigration at Suburban Temple - Kol Ami in Beachwood on Sunday, August 11th. Jewish communities across the nation gathered together to demand an end to our current government's policies that are endangering, abusing, incarcerating, and deporting refugees, asylum seekers, and immigrants.



We heard from amazing speakers, including an immigration lawyer that discussed his experiences at the border and the local impact. Also from Dr. Arthur Lavin, a pediatrician

previously from Canton, who discussed the effect of trauma on children. We were given time to call our senators and leave a message asking them to do something to stop the inhumane treatment of immigrants and asylum seekers. They urged us to do the following: 1. Bare witness like the vigil 2. Write your elected officials 3. Register voters, and 4. Get the voters to the polls. It is our responsibility to let members of Congress know what we expect from them to help end this crisis.
