## Dispelling the Myth of Top-Down Leadership

In Exodus 17, the Israelites defeat the Amalekites in battle. It is a remarkable story about effective leadership – in biblical times and today. The story begins with Moses telling Joshua to select fighters for Joshua to lead in combat. We expect that, in handing Joshua leadership, Moses has empowered him with a mission and the resources to succeed. As it turns out, though, Joshua and Moses need each other more than we might expect. Why?

Because with God's direction, the Israelites win only as long as Moses' hands are raised, holding a holy rod; they lose when Moses lowers his hands. Working together, the army needs to be on the field, Joshua needs to lead them, and Moses needs to keep his hands raised.

In one more turn of this story, even these efforts prove insufficient. As you might imagine, Moses' arms tire. He can lift his arms on his own for only so long. He needs support, too. To me, this is the point in the story at which the most interesting people appear: Aaron and Hur. They hold up Moses' arms because all leaders – even Moses – need help from others. In this story, as in so many others, leadership appears to be top down. A closer look reveals a set of essential, interdependent relationships at play. The *myth* is top down. The reality is that *we need each other* to be successful.

In contemporary leadership, we think about leaders as charismatic, visionary, and filled with purpose. We think about Moses and Joshua. Yet research has broadened who we should see as leaders: people who enable and support others. Do we need charismatic leaders? Yes. But we need other types of leaders even more – people who quietly support the success of small groups; people who enable dialogue to explore and encourage the differences among us; and, people who willingly set aside their own egos to ensure a community's success. We need Aarons and Hurs.

We have also long known that we need more – and far more diverse - leaders who are skilled at enabling the excellence of others. Demand outstrips supply, and quality leaders appear to be in short supply. As you think about your own congregation and community, what would be possible if you doubled or tripled the number of people who see themselves as engaged and effective leaders? What would happen if this community of leaders trusted each other and had shared expectations for success while also allowing each person to contribute their talents and strengths? These questions reflect a deeper reading of Exodus 17, one that helps dispel a myth and introduces an expanding reality that includes trust, humility, dialogue and interdependence.

**Message from the President**

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are but a speck in our rear view mirror. Although out of sight, they are not out of mind. Without a permanent rabbi, this year's High Holidays will be embedded in our memory for many years to come. Fortunately, I believe, most of us will look back with pleasant memories.

We enter this season each year reflecting on our past, present, and future. It's a time for introspection. Are we the person we want to be? We can do this any day of the year. What makes the High Holidays special are sharing with a congregation, our friends, our neighbors. The process is enhanced by inspiration, which as Jews typically comes with assistance from the rabbi.

Since 1954, Temple Israel has been blessed in having Rabbis Gorin, Spitzer and Adland. All of which had their own unique style, yet with similar results; respected and beloved.

So this year we entered into a season of knowing, yet with questions. Who will lead us? Who will engage us? Who will inspire us? I believe those questions were answered on Erev Rosh Hashanah when Rabbi Wolfman began the service by leaving the Bima and addressing the congregation from the main floor of the sanctuary.

He commanded comfort and respect from the beginning. Who was this stranger among us? He was a rabbi from Boston. A rabbi who took the time to get to know us, yet never having met us. What we saw was a finished product. A rabbi prepared to lead, engage, and inspire a congregation he had never met, yet we felt he was one of us. The answer to the question not yet asked is preparation. So who prepared Rabbi Wolfman to lead the Temple Israel congregation in Canton, Ohio so reverently?

The answer is two-fold. First, and most obvious to those at services, was Shelley Schweitzer. Shelley and Rabbi Wolfman had known each other for about 25 years through the URJ. When it came time to find a rabbi for this year's High Holidays, Shelley told us she had the perfect person.

The second was through our Rabbi Emeriti, Jon Adland and John Spitzer. Many of us saw interaction between Rabbi Wolfman and Rabbi Spitzer. Seeing them interact up close, I knew we were in good hands.

What no one saw, but briefly mentioned, was the time Rabbi Adland devoted to prepare Rabbi Wolfman for the Canton, Ohio/Temple Israel experience. Both rabbis spent many hours on the phone or emailing so Rabbi Wolfman would be prepared to lead a service in which we were accustomed.

So, like many events with positive outcomes, this was successful due to people working together. Four partners, Shelley, David, John and Jon working together because they love and care for our congregation.



**Recognizing the Good**

As Thanksgiving approaches this month, we are reminded that being thankful is an appreciated and necessary commitment in our everyday lives. Though Thanksgiving is not a Jewish holiday, being thankful is a very Jewish way of life. One of our values, *Hakarat HaTov*, is commonly known as being grateful, but it is literally translated as “recognizing the good.” When we make it a practice to recognize the good, we develop an appreciation for all areas of life even when things do not go according to plan. The true meaning of *Hakarat HaTov* gives us a positive outlook and allows us to walk through the world knowing that there is beauty and kindness with every step we take.

Besides this one Jewish value, there are many places within Judaism designed to act as a reminder to recognize the good. For instance, in our morning blessings, we say “*Modeh Ani*” or “I give thanks.” At Passover time, we say “*Dayenu*” or “It would have been enough.” Before we eat a meal and after we eat a meal, we say “*HaMotzi*” and “*Birkat Hamazon*” thanking G-d for food. It is evident. Giving thanks and Judaism go hand in hand. As parents and teachers, it is essential to teach this everyday practice to children. In one example, the Grinspoon Foundation’s PJ Library program has created a list of “Eight Ways to Teach Kids About Gratitude.” Their list of eight ways includes “talking about it,” working on an “attitude of gratitude,” and participating in the Jewish tradition of finding 100 blessings each day and “giving to others.”

At Chadash, we want our students to recognize the good as they approach their Jewish education, and we know that with all the curriculum and applications we utilize in our school, recognizing the good could quite possibly be the most essential ingredient of them all. It seems only apropos that as American Jews, we celebrate Thanksgiving for all of its lessons and be thankful for all its worth.
