Rabbi Komerofsky provided the following bio for your information:



Rabbi David Komerofsky has been the spiritual leader of Temple Chai in San Antonio, Texas since 2014. He was ordained a rabbi by the Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion in 1999, and graduated from the University of Cincinnati in 1993. He began his career at his alma mater seminary in Cincinnati immediately after ordination, eventually becoming dean of students and director of the rabbinical school.

In 2006, David was recruited to Austin to become executive director of the Texas Hillel Foundation at the University of Texas. In Austin, he was active in the wider university and Jewish community and was honored locally and nationally for his Hillel leadership. In 2013, he relocated to San Antonio and began working remotely for Hillel International. Soon after coming to San Antonio, he was called to Temple Chai part-time, which until his arrival, had been served by visiting rabbis. Under his leadership, Temple Chai has grown significantly and eventually his Hillel portfolio gave way to his work in the congregation.

David's professional interests off the pulpit include regular learning and teaching and interfaith conversation, collaboration, and activism. He also enjoys history, architecture, comedy, random trivia, and travel. Much to the delight of his wife, he does not play golf or watch football, so she has his undivided attention to bother her most Sundays.

A native of Akron, Ohio, David is married to Ronit Sherwin, CEO of the Jewish Federation of San Antonio. Their blended family includes two sets of twins, ages 19 (both in college) and 10, plus a mini goldendoodle puppy, a cat, and a guinea pig.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

On Friday evening, January 17th, Temple Israel will celebrate our annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Shabbat service. This year, we will host the Afro-Semitic Experience and their unique style of music. I strongly urge that you attend. Their music begins at 6:45 and services begin at 7:15. Hope to see you on the 17th.

The following article is titled "Jews and the Civil Rights Movement." It came from the Religious Action Center (RAC).

Judaism teaches respect for the fundamental rights of others as each person's duty to God. "What is hateful to you, do not do to your neighbor" (Babylonian Talmud, Shabbat 31a). Equality in the Jewish tradition is based on the concept that all of God's children are "created in the image of God" (Genesis 1:27). From that flows the biblical injunction, "You shall have one law for the stranger and the citizen alike: for I, Adonai, am your God" (Leviticus 24:22).

American Jews played a significant role in the founding and funding of some of the most important civil right organizations, including the NAACP, the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights, the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) and the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC). In 1909, Henry Moscowitz joined W.E.B. DuBois and other civil rights leaders to found the NAACP. Kivie Kaplan, a vice-chairman of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (now the URJ), served as the national president of the NAACP from 1966 to 1975. Arnie Aronson worked with A. Philip Randolph and Roy Wilkins to found the Leadership Conference.

From 1910 to 1940, more than 2,000 primary and secondary schools and twenty black colleges (including Howard, Dillard and Fisk universities) were established in whole or in part by contributions from Jewish philanthropist Julius Rosenwald. At the height of the so-called "Rosenwald Schools," nearly forty percent of southern blacks were educated at one of these institutions.

During the Civil Rights Movement, Jewish activists represented a disproportionate number of whites involved in the struggle. Jews made up half of the young people who participated in the Mississippi Freedom Summer in 1964. Leaders of the Reform Movement were arrested with Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in St. Augustine, Florida, in 1964, after a challenge to racial segregation in public accommodations. Most famously, Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel marched arm-in-arm with Dr. King in his 1965 March on Selma.

The Civil Right Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 were drafted in the conference room of Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism, under the aegis of the Leadership Conference, which for decades was located in the RAC's building. The Jewish community has continued its support of civil rights laws addressing persistent discrimination in voting, housing, and employment against not only women and people of color, but also in the gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender community and the disabled community.

**MLK Shabbat
Friday, January 17, 2020**

On Friday evening, January 17, 2020, Temple Israel will hold its annual Martin Luther King Shabbat service. A special performance of a unique style of music from the Afro-Semitic Experience will prelude the service at 6:45 and the service will begin at 7:15. We encourage everyone to attend the pre-service concert.

Temple’s Shabbat service will be led by both of Temple Israel’s Rabbi Emeriti, Rabbi Jon Adland and Rabbi John Spitzer and music and prayers will be led by the Afro-Semitic Experience throughout. The Temple Israel Martin Luther King Shabbat service is part of the MLK Commission schedule and is the oldest ongoing commemoration of Reverend King in a white community. Temple has been honoring Rev. King’s memory with a celebration of diversity and of our collective commitment to the values of human and civil rights for over three decades. We encourage the public to join us and to enjoy the special Shabbat Oneg immediately following the service.



The Afro-Semitic Experience

Co-founded by African-American jazz pianist Warren Byrd, and Jewish-American jazz bassist David Chevan in 1998, *The Afro-Semitic Experience* is a band that combines an eclectic array of styles, sophisticated musicianship, good songwriting, deep grooves, and years of friendship with a simple message: Unity in the Community. With their unique instrumentation, and their ability to get an audience on its feet, *The Afro-Semitic Experience* is redefining the jazz concert. This is a band beyond category—their music is an intricate tapestry of spiritual, world-beat, funk, jazz, cantorial, gospel, salsa, swing . . . soul-driven music. Their concerts are celebrations where they play great music, tell stories, and offer a positive and meaningful message. Their CDs have garnered critical acclaim and made numerous best-of lists. Their newest work, *Jazz Souls on Fire*, pays tribute to some of the *Afro-Semitic Experience’s favorite* composers, ones whose own creativity inspired that of the members of the group.



Lighting Our Way to Sacred Time

Creating sacred space for our children is an essential element to their spiritual development. As adults, the process of creating pockets of spiritual moments is simply defined as we cook a holiday meal, walk into a synagogue or even just take in a beautiful natural scene. Children, on the other hand, are not predisposed to understand what is spiritual and what is not. It is our job as adults to set up what we believe would be a spiritual mood for them. Children need direction, and we are lucky that our Jewish rituals are designed to do just that.

For instance, there is not a Jewish holiday that does not begin with the lighting of candles. From Shabbat to Hanukkah to a Passover Seder, with the flick of a match, an ambiance has been set. The air has changed as the lighting has dimmed, and perhaps a feeling of quiet reflection is pronounced as a prayer tumbles from our mouths.

Sacredness is also created through our intent, our *Kavanah*, and as we shift a moment into one with sacred meaning, it is important to point it out to our children. A change in our environment is not always necessarily seen, but it can be felt. Developing the muscle to recognize these moments, can be done by defining our intention.

The weekly Shabbat rituals are a perfect time to help your children embrace the sacred space that is created at home or in the synagogue. A special time celebrated together as a family will keep these practices special.

Brad Ortman has been engaged by the immigration committee to help better educate the community on immigration law.
